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Is voter fraud and manipulation an agenda item for Hamblen and her far left companions? Following the lead of far-left dark money groups, Hamblen attempted to lower the voting age to sixteen in 2021 and 2022. Her counterparts in the senate took the agenda a step further by attempting to register people to vote without their knowledge..... 54

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Hamblen’s has been accused of “ignoring [her] constituents” and delivering secrecy and cronyism for her introducing and supporting legislation to keeping the identities of applicants for appointed executive positions in government hidden from the public. 72 percent of the people polled on this legislation were against it. 70

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In an attack on free speech, Hamblen tried to use her own “trans rights” bill to ban conservative speakers on college campuses. Hamblen was outraged that commentator Matt Walsh spoke at New Mexico State University (NMSU) because he is “transphobe.” Apparently disagreeing with Hamblen on transgender issues is “hate speech” and therefore not allowed. Ironically, she launched the attack while calling herself a “tried and true supporter of Free Speech.” 77

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For eight years, Hamblen served as President of the Las Cruces chapter of PFLAG, a radical support and advocacy group for the LGBTQ+ agenda. 98

In June 2020, Hamblen spoke out against the death of George Floyd and wanted people to support BLM speech instead of celebrating Pride Month: “wishing someone Happy Pride is inappropriate given the current state of our country.” 101

Hamblen was a Grand Marshall at the 2021 Southern New Mexico Pride Celebration, which included Drag Story Time. 103

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Hamblen believes America is “stolen land” and that black people “built it.” 110

Hamblen’s wife Char Ullman is an “educational anthropologist” and professor who is a leading champion of “diversity equity and inclusion” (DEI) in education and created a masters degree program with a “Concentration in Diversity, Equity and Social justice.” The program looks at many “kinds of oppression” with courses in: critical race theory, critical disability studies, queer theory, environmental racism, Latinx criticism and post-colonial feminism. . 111

Hamblen’s wife Char Ullman wants to “queer” the classrooms—yes even “early childhood” classrooms. Ullman even received a \$10,000 grant from the El Paso Community Foundation for her “2-day summer advocacy institute” called “Queer(in)g Our Classrooms: LGBTQ+ Students In El Paso From Early Childhood Through Undergraduate Education.” 118

Hamblen’s wife Char Ullman teaches teachers how to engage in “subversive action” to “disrupt the hegemonic effects of the heterosexual matrix” – for instance by “queering the high school prom.” 119

Carrie and Char created a video of their “Happy Homo Love Story” 121

Hamblen was sued by the New Mexico Educational Assistance Foundation for failing to pay back her student loans in 2009. Since joining the State Senate, Hamblen has voted to use taxpayer dollars to cover tuition for undergraduate students of any public or tribal college in New Mexico..... 122

The Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce, which Hamblen runs as CEO, is “Not in Good Standing” with the New Mexico Secretary of State. The chamber has not filed an annual report for four years and owes four years of fines..... 127

Hamblen was registered agent of Southern New Mexico Pride, a nonprofit corporation which has its status revoked by the state for failure to file required annual reports. 135

Much like her issues handing simple compliance requirements with the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce, Hamblen continues to miss campaign finance deadlines. On three separate occasions, Hamblen missed the reporting deadline for her campaign’s financial activity..... 140

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Hamblen reiterates all of the radical leftwing talking points on race, calling herself a “white woman of privilege,” Hamblen supports George Floyd and a litany of other BLM causes. She has complained about “white fragility.” 145

In 2023, Hamblen voted to give politicians a pay raise, including a 53% pay-raise the Democrat governor. Despite the fact that the country was dealing with extreme inflation rates, 17.6% of people in New Mexico were living in poverty, Hamblen still voted for pay increases of roughly 40 percent across the board for statewide elected officials..... 147

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Hamblen isn’t “pro-choice” she is actively pro-abortion – she voted to direct millions of tax dollars to fund abortions in New Mexico. The \$10 million in taxpayer money helped fund the

center which “is set to include basic gynecological care, contraception, gender affirming care, miscarriage management, abortion and preventative care.” 153

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Hamblen voted to expand the scope of public employee unions, by changing the definition of certain research park corporations to make them public employers for collective bargaining purposes..... 166

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Hamblen was a paranoid Covid alarmist who told people to “wear the damn mask” and not to meet together for Thanksgiving. She refused to see her own mother for at least 8 months. 170

Hamblen is a radical leftist who unseated a moderate Democrat in the 2020 primary, and has attacked moderate Democrats and clearly thinks she is superior. She went on a “progressive rant” against the *Albuquerque Journal* in which she defended herself against the narrative that she wants to stop development, hurt the energy sector and defund the police, among other things—by not denying any of those accusation but rewording them..... 173

Hamblen said she had to do “a lot of behind the scenes stuff” as an LGBTQ activist to avoid jeopardizing her job as a journalist. 177

Hamblen said she ran for senate because she didn't want to run for house, which would mean going before voters every 2 years instead of every 4. It has been reported that Hamblen only plans to serve two terms and will "groom" a Latina to take her place in 2028. 179

GROWING UP

Carrie Hamblen is originally from El Paso, Texas. Born in Wisconsin, Carrie's family decided to stay in El Paso after her father completed his career in the Army. Unfortunately, when she was 12, her father passed away suddenly. Being raised by a single parent, Carrie learned how to be resourceful and active. At the age of 13, she began volunteering as a swim instructor with the El Paso Parks and Recreation Department. Twice a day, for three hours, Carrie would teach small children how to swim at Veterans Park Pool. At the age of 16, she became a lifeguard, and at 17, managed her first outdoor swimming pool. By the time she was 19, she was troubleshooting problem pools in El Paso, fixing failing programs, increasing revenues, and nurturing customer relationships.

While in high school, Carrie served as the Student Body Manager. This included running the pep assemblies, announcing the marching band at events, and reading the school announcements. She also served as the editor of the school newspaper (the Aquila) and was a photographer for the yearbook.

EDUCATION

It was her love of speaking in front of people (and journalism) that led her to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Broadcast Journalism from the University of Texas at El Paso. After graduating in 1992, she moved to Las Cruces to pursue a Master's Degree in Communication Studies from New Mexico State University and graduated in 1995. In 2010, Carrie returned to NMSU to earn a Master's Degree in Public Administration, graduating in 2014.

HER PROFESSIONAL LIFE

She began working as a student employee at KRWG in 1992 and was promoted to Operations Manager in 1997. While there, Carrie hosted classical and jazz programs, All Things Considered, and Fresh Air, before settling in as the Morning Edition Host. She also wrote, produced, and hosted her public affairs program "Images" for 15 years. During that time, she won numerous awards for her interviewing and reporting.

In 2012, Carrie became the CEO/President of the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce, an organization which focuses on creating support for local businesses and creating more awareness about sustainable communities. Carrie serves as the liaison between the Green Chamber and private, nonprofit, and governmental entities. However, despite the hardship of losing family members, Carrie has also had some incredible experiences and memories. In addition to graduating from college with two Masters Degrees, it was marrying her wife, Char, in 2013 that was the most memorable moment in her life. After fighting for marriage equality for over a decade, Carrie and Char were the fifth couple to be granted a marriage license on August 21, 2013. On that day, the County Clerk's office began issuing same-sex marriage licenses, arguing that the New Mexico State Constitution did not specify the gender of those getting married. In December of 2013, the New Mexico Supreme Court ruled in favor of this effort. Carrie and Char heard the news while on their honeymoon in Aruba.

The second most memorable moment was meeting former President Barak Obama while in Washington, DC for the designation of the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument. Carrie was invited to speak at the ceremony that designated OMDP, being the sole representative speaking for New Mexico. She spoke of the

RESEARCH FINDINGS


Hamblen told her “coming out story” and, as a 55-year old, was weirdly descriptive of her 2nd grade crush “Susie” as blonde and tan and smelling “like the sun.” Hamblen also describes her deep resentment towards Christianity and traditional family values, saying she stopped going to church at the age of twelve. *Hamblen clearly sees herself as a victim and freedom fighter.*

⇒ Hamblen begins her coming out story, stating: “I knew in the second grade that I liked girls. My first crush, her name was Susie, and she had blonde hair. And she always was like out in the sun and she was tan and her skin smelled like the sun. You know that smell after you’ve been out in the sun for a long period of time, that was her skin. [relevant segment begins 00:48]

- ⇒ At the 1:10 mark of the video, Hamblen talks about what was going on in the country at that time of her coming out. She called Anita Bryant “a horrible person” and at the 1:14 mark she claimed that “Reagan ignored the AIDS crisis”.
- ⇒ Minute 1:34 - Hamblen’s family went to the Lutheran church and she claimed to have “stopped going to church at 12 because she kept hearing from the pulpit about how bad of a person she was”.
- ⇒ At the 2:11 minute of the video, Hamblen claimed to have “performed as straight in high school”.

Of the seven pieces of legislation Hamblen has sponsored in 2024, six of them are already dead, despite Democratic control.


⇒ **Hamblen introduced six pieces of legislation in 2024 that died.**

- [SB 2](#) – “Low Income Solar Act” The bill died after being analyzed and rejected by the Energy, Minerals, and Natural Resources Department (EMNRD) and the Human Services Department.
- [SB 109](#) – “Catastrophic Business Relief Act” involves the creation of a fund to provide loans to certain businesses that have experienced a catastrophic incident that threatens its survival.
- [SB 121](#) – “Solar Market Development Tax Credit Changes” The LFC had serious concerns about the substantial risk to state revenues from tax expenditures and the increase in revenue volatility from erosion of the revenue base. The bill died in committee.
- [SB 133](#) – “DOT Disadvantaged Business Program” requiring the department of transportation to administer a disadvantaged business program expending no less than thirty percent of program eligible federally assisted contract funds with disadvantaged business enterprises.
- [SB 272](#) – “Sexual Orientation and Gender Orientation Data” requiring certain executive departments and public bodies to collect demographic data pertaining to sexual orientation and gender identity. Died in committee.
- [HB 127](#) – “Age 21 for Firearm Purchases”

⇒ **The only legislation that Hamblen has introduced/sponsored in 2024 that was signed into law was [SB 236](#), a bill to amend procedures for determining gross receipts tax increments used to fund metropolitan redevelopment projects; delaying the effective date of laws 2023, chapter 112.**

In an attack on the Oil & Gas Industry, Hamblen voted to create and fund a “Sustainable Economy Task Force” for the “purpose of developing an annually updated strategic plan to transition the state economy away from reliance on natural resource extraction.”

- ⇒ On March 3, 2021, Hamblen [voted](#) for [SB 112](#) that, according to its proponents, is designed to make the New Mexico economy and government revenue less dependent on the Oil & Gas Industry.
- ⇒ The Industry generates “[about a third](#)” of the NM budget, bringing in \$2.3 billion in tax revenue –and more in royalties.
- ⇒ The new “task force” would get \$100k to annually devise a “Strategic plan” by which state agencies would have to abide.



SB 112 Sustainable Economy Task Force

Summary: SB 112 Sustainable Economy Task Force, sponsored by Senator Mimi Stewart, would allocate \$100,000 to fund the creation a Sustainable Economy Task Force that would be required to develop a strategic plan to transition the state economy away from reliance on natural resource extraction and require state agencies to comply with strategic plan recommendations. The sustainable economy task force would develop a plan for 2022 and each fiscal year thereafter through 2027. The Task Force would be comprised of the Governor, Land Commissioner, the State Treasurer, the Secretary of Finance, the Secretary of Taxation, the Secretary of Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources, the Secretary of Economic Development, the Secretary of Indian Affairs, or their designees. Each member could appoint two other voting members from the public.

History: New Mexico’s reliance upon gas and oil revenues results in large surpluses in boom years, but in bust years the state experiences serious budget challenges and for almost a century that is precipitated by increases or declines in the price of gas and oil and/or the demand for gas and oil.

- According to the Legislative Finance Committee, New Mexico typically receives about \$2 billion in direct revenue from oil and gas production through severance and property taxes and royalty and rental income.
- Additional indirect income comes from sales and income taxes on oil and gas drilling and service, which generate about \$300 million.
- In addition to production taxes, New Mexico collects royalties from oil and gas production on federal and state land and imposes property taxes both on the assessed value of the products severed and sold and on the production equipment.
- Most oil and gas revenue is deposited into the general fund. Most years, oil and gas revenue make up 15 percent to 25 percent of total general fund revenue, although that figure fluctuates depending on economic conditions and the health of the energy industry.
- Jim Peach, Regents professor of economics at New Mexico State University: “For at least 40 years people in the state government and the Legislature have known that they are overly dependent on oil and gas for state revenue. Like it or not, we’re at the tail end of the fossil fuel age.”
- At a Legislative Finance Committee meeting in early December, the state’s economists said that revenues for fiscal year 2021 will be \$850 million lower than in 2020. Seventy percent of that drop is from reduced oil and gas income brought about by the COVID-19 disaster.

- ⇒ The bill passed and became law.
- ⇒ The Rio Grande Valley Foundation called the bill one of “[the worst bills of 2021.](#)”

SB 112: Sustainable economy task force: creates a task force with the express goal of reducing reliance on oil and gas. Of course, New Mexico’s Democrat-controlled Legislature has had ample time to enact public policies to “diversify” New Mexico’s economy;

In a 2020 interview, Hamblen stated she supports a moratorium on fracking.

⇒ In an [Albuquerque Journal questionnaire](#), Hamblen stated in her answer:

- “Would you support or oppose a moratorium on fracking? And should the state impose additional renewable energy mandates as a way to address climate change concerns? We do need a moratorium on fracking but also provide job training and resources to those impacted by the decrease in oil and gas use while we increase our implementation of renewable energy. Providing jobs and ways for people to make the same living will leave our state will be better off.”

In an attempt to push “green energy,” Hamblen introduced an ill-written bill, SB 2, that the Human Services Department claimed would increase the cost of low-income housing. The Energy, Minerals, and Natural Resources Department (EMNRD) also found “significant issues” with the bill, including discriminating against rural areas. SB 2 died after the analysis reports were released.

⇒ **SB 2** was introduced by Hamblen in January 2024 and was an attempt to add a new section to the Public Utility Act that would incentivize solar energy in low-income housing.

⇒ Hamblen’s attempt at her own version of the ‘Green New Deal’ was met with a similar response to that of the federal legislation. The fiscal irresponsibility in this bill like AOC’s bill would be damning to the lower and middle class as confirmed two state agencies.

⇒ According to EMNRD, the bill did not incentivize property owners and it discriminated against rural communities because it only applied to properties connected to investor-owned utilities.

SB2 is effectively community solar on a smaller scale – the scale of a single qualifying low-income multifamily residential building. However, SB2 is a narrow policy lever, in that it only applies to investor-owned utilities (IOUs) and not rural electric coops. This means that only those multifamily buildings in the service areas of the IOUs will have access to the benefits of SB2, leaving most of rural New Mexico out.

EMNRD also notes that SB2 may lack sufficient incentives for a property owner of a low-income multifamily residential property to install a solar energy system in the first place. . Under a net-metering scheme as described in SB2, the direct financial benefit of reduced energy bills will go to the tenants, bypassing the owner entirely. This leaves the property owner with the financial burden of the purchase and installation of the system without the reward, making such an investment less appealing. One way a landlord might choose to offset the costs associated with installing a distributed energy system could be through raising rents or evicting tenants to replace them with those paying higher rents, neither of which is disallowed in SB2 and could negate any financial benefit for residents.

⇒ **According to the Human Services Department, the bill would require capital costs that would likely fall on the low-income tenants to pay.**

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

SB2 is unclear what incentive the owner of a qualifying low-income multifamily residential property would have to incur the capital cost of installing such a system. As the capital cost of the system and production meter and the cost of needed upgrades to the utility system may be significant, there may not be sufficient financial incentive for the installation of such systems.

It is also noted that the legislation does not prevent a building owner from increasing tenant rent to pay for the cost of solar energy systems. This could result in unintended consequences for landlords to increase their low-income residents' rent to offset system installation costs, which could offset any financial benefit the tenants were supposed to receive.

SB 19 was introduced by Hamblen January 18, 2024 in attempt to create the Catastrophic Business Relief Act (“Act”). The bill called for NMFA to make catastrophic business relief loans to qualifying businesses (as defined in the Act) in an amount up to 200% of a qualifying business’s adjusted monthly expenses. The sloppiness and incompetency of this legislation was more than pointed out in LFC analysis.

⇒ The LFC office’s analysis of Hamblen’s SB 19 was negative. There was no anticipated revenue due to the unknown interest in the program and the projected cost for operations was twice the amount suggested in the bill. The repayment schedule was flawed, and the suggested loan calculations could be **insufficient for the business to recover.**

Revenue: The loans would generate an interest income at the rate of 1%, however it is difficult to anticipate the demand for the program. Additionally, although the Fund would generate income from investments, it is difficult to predict with any certainty what that figure would be.

Expenditures: NMFA projects that the \$250k appropriation to the NMFA is insufficient to cover the administrative costs. Program implementation and the first year of policy creation, underwriting, and lending is projected to cost \$500,000. The variable expenses will occur in underwriting and servicing loans based on volume, thus if there is stronger demand for the program, the cost of administering the program will increase dramatically in the short term and long term. NMFA requests that it be allowed to recover from the fund the actual cost of administration rather than a fixed amount from the general fund.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Repayment Schedule: The annual interest only repayment provisions are similar to those contained in the Small Business Recovery Loan Fund. NMFA’s experience is all repayments should be monthly so that the borrower can more actively plan and manage loan repayments.

Loan Amount: The prescribed loan amount calculation may be insufficient for the business to recover from the catastrophic event even if the applicant is considered creditworthy. Raising the maximum loan amount, while also allowing the NMFA to determine the final loan amount within

⇒ Hamblen’s incompetency was really spotlighted in this legislation. Either she wasn’t worried about the passage of the bill, or she was in over her head and not capable of putting the proposal together. Either way, the bill “died” in committee and is postponed indefinitely.

To amend existing law, Hamblen sponsored legislation to revise the eligibility requirements and raise the total amount of attainable credits for the “Solar Market Development Tax Credit Program”.

⇒ **SB-121** – An act to amend the ownership eligibility requirements for the new solar market development income tax credit; increasing the annual aggregate amount of credits that may be certified in certain calendar years.

SUMMARY

Synopsis of Senate Bill 121

Senate Bill 121 (SB121) amends Section 7-2-18.31 NMSA 1978 in the following ways:

- 1) Taxpayers who install an eligible solar system on a property held by that taxpayer in leasehold from federally recognized Indian nations, tribes, or pueblos will be eligible for the tax credit;
- 2) Taxpayers who were eligible for the credit in tax years 2020 through 2023 but did not receive a certificate of eligibility due to the aggregate cap of available credits being reached in those tax years may apply or reapply to EMNRD for a certificate of eligibility for the qualifying solar system in tax year 2023. The aggregate cap on this supplemental opportunity is \$20 million. Certificates issued pursuant to this supplemental opportunity must be claimed within 12 months of issuance, rather than the general three-year rule;
- 3) Increases the aggregate cap of available tax credits to \$30 million annually for calendar years 2024 through 2032; and
- 4) Clarifies that a taxpayer who receives a certificate of eligibility from EMNRD under the special provisions for denied claims must claim their tax credit from the Taxation and Revenue Department (TRD) within 12 months following the calendar year in which the certificate was issued.

⇒ **The LFC did a fiscal impact study on the solar tax credit program. The main issue with the program is oversubscription, exhaustion of the annual aggregate cap, and commensurate rejection of otherwise eligible applications. Citizens of New Mexico that paid to have solar panels installed have been denied the tax credits they were counting on to defray the cost of the cost of installation.**

Oversubscription and SB121’s Cap Increase and Lookback Provisions

However, the credit’s popularity has created constant issues with oversubscription, exhaustion of the annual aggregate cap, and commensurate rejection of otherwise perfectly eligible applications – disappointing New Mexicans and creating financial difficulties for those who had counted on the tax credit to defray their solar costs. The yearly aggregate cap is usually met three to five months before the end of a tax year.

EMNRD’s informal records show that at least 849 applications could not be funded in 2021 and 2022 combined. From 2020 to 2023, issued credits surged 43 percent. It is likely that the current \$12 million fund cap will be exceeded in 2023 and future years. EMNRD estimates at least 500 additional applications for the 2023 tax year will be rejected due to exhaustion of the cap. These numbers are estimates, as EMNRD has no visibility into the total number of taxpayers who could have, but did not, attempt to

Other clean energy incentives in the bill include:

- An increase in the aggregate cap for the Solar Market Development Tax Credit from \$12 million to \$30 million with an additional \$20 million available for homeowners who missed out on the credits in recent years because of the existing cap.
- Geothermal heat pump and electricity credits.
- A Gross Receipts Tax deduction for energy storage systems sold to governments.

“We advocated for these changes to the immensely popular Solar Market Development Tax so that more New Mexicans, including those on tribal lands and those who may have missed out on receiving the credit in prior years through no fault of their own, can access this important clean energy solution,” said **Dylan Fuge, Deputy Secretary of the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department**, which administers the solar tax credit program. “We thank the governor and our legislators for these thoughtful reforms.”

Hamblen sponsored legislation forcing the Department of Transportation to administer a “disadvantaged business enterprise program” to use funding to do business with “certified disadvantage business enterprises.” The legislation died before going to a vote.

⇒ **The US Department of Transportation’s disadvantaged business enterprise program is designed to remedy the alleged ongoing discrimination and the continuing effects of past discrimination in federally-assisted highway, transit, airport and highway safety financial assistance transportation contracting markets nationwide.**

Background

DOT's Operating Administrations distribute substantial funds each year to finance construction projects initiated by state and local governments, public transit and airport agencies. DOT has the important responsibility of ensuring that firms competing for DOT-assisted contracts for these projects are not disadvantaged by unlawful discrimination. The Department’s most important tool for meeting this requirement has been its DBE program, which originally began in 1980 as a minority/women’s business enterprise program established by regulation under the authority of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and other nondiscrimination statutes that apply to DOT financial assistance programs.

⇒ **Hamblen’s legislation, [SB 133](#), attempted to force the State of New Mexico to spend “no less than thirty percent of federally assisted contract funds eligible for the disadvantaged business enterprise program with certified disadvantaged business enterprises” as state in the bill.**

A. The department shall administer the disadvantaged business enterprise program provided by federal law and shall expend no less than thirty percent of federally assisted contract funds eligible for the disadvantaged business

enterprise program with certified disadvantaged business enterprises.

(1) "certified disadvantaged business enterprise" means a business certified pursuant to federal law by the department as a small business:

(a) that performs or seeks to perform transportation-related work;

(b) that is at least fifty-one percent owned by one or more persons who are socially and economically disadvantaged or, in the case of a corporation, in which fifty-one percent of the stock is owned by one or more such persons; and

(c) whose management and daily business operations are controlled by one or more of the socially and economically disadvantaged persons who own it; and

(2) "federally assisted contract" means a contract between a recipient and a contractor funded in whole or in part with financial assistance from the United States department of transportation, including letters of credit or loan guarantees, except a contract solely for the purchase of land."

Hamblen wants the government to know if your child is gay or trans. She introduced legislation to collect more demographic data on the LGBTQ population. When her legislation failed, Gov. Grisham’s signed a controversial executive order demanding state government departments collect demographic data on sexual orientation and gender identity—including data on minors. Hamblen was the biggest supporter of this executive order. In fact, in 2024, Hamblen has sponsored legislation to expand the executive order and make it permanent and irreversible by future governors, but this bill also failed.

- ⇒ In early 2021, Hamblen [sponsored SB 316](#) “Gender and Orientation Data Collection.” The legislation passed the Senate but did not get a vote in the house.
- ⇒ In August 2021, Governor Grisham signed an executive order directing executive state departments to begin collecting information pertaining to sexual orientation.

⇒ **To strengthen the governor’s executive order, Hamblen stated she would resubmit a similar bill as SB 316 again.**

In an interview, Hamblen said the bill would reintroduced in a future session, since Lujan Grisham's executive order could be undone by a future governor. Lujan Grisham is seeking a second and final term, due to term limits, in the 2022 general election.

According to a legislative analysis, the bill would not have required reporting demographic data more locally than by ZIP code.

⇒ In early 2024, Hamblen sponsored [SB-272](#) to prevent future governors from shutting the program down. SB 272 would task public bodies either directly or through contractors to collect voluntarily offered data on sexual orientation or gender identity.

- “B. An executive department or public body, in the course of collecting demographic data directly or through a contractor, shall collect voluntary self-identification information pertaining to sexual orientation and gender identity.”

⇒ The purpose of such collection would be to inform the government on spending and policy priorities.

- “F. An executive department or public body shall only use information voluntarily provided about sexual orientation and gender identity for demographic analysis, coordination of care, quality improvement of its services, conducting approved research, fulfilling reporting requirements or guiding policy or funding decisions.”

⇒ The departments identified to carry out this task were as follows:

A. For the purposes of this section:

(1) "executive department" means any of the following departments of the executive branch of state government:

(a) health care authority department;

(b) children, youth and families department;

(c) department of health;
 (d) department of public safety;

Hamblen doesn't think parents need to know if their minor children change their legal names.

⇒ **On March 14, 2023, Carrie Hamblen voted for HB 31, the No Publication Required For Name Changes Act, which allows minors to change their name without parental notification if the state believes it's in the minor's best interest.**

- House Bill 31 clarifies that a New Mexico resident who is fourteen years or older may petition the district court for a name change. HB31 prohibits a court from requiring notice to one or more legal parents of an applicant who is under fourteen, if the court finds that such notice will jeopardize the applicant's personal safety. Lastly, HB31 repeals Section 40-8-2 NMSA 1978 requiring publication of a petition for a name change and provides an exception upon a court finding that publication will jeopardize the applicant's personal safety. ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))

⇒ **Gender identity is cited as one of the reasons why someone would change their name.**

- Individuals may choose to change their name for a variety of reasons, including for divorce, to match their gender identity, or to distance themselves from abusive partners. Repealing this requirement will likely benefit domestic violence survivors or others who might otherwise face violence if required to comply with the publication requirement. ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))

⇒ **The bill passed and became law.**

Hamblen voted to protect radical gender surgeries for minors in New Mexico.

⇒ **On March 7, 2023, Carrie Hamblen voted for HB 7, titled **Reproductive & Gender-Affirming Health Care**, which **prohibits public entities from interfering with "gender-affirming" care or abortions.****

- House Bill 7, Reproductive and Gender-Affirming Health Care, adds sections to Chapter 24, NMSA 1978 (which is entitled “Health and Safety”), the effect of which is to prohibit public bodies from discriminating against persons based on their use or non-use of reproductive or gender-affirming care. Section 1 of the bill names the new sections the “Reproductive and Gender-Affirming Health Care Freedom Act.” Section 2 establishes definitions, including defining “gender-affirming care” as encompassing psychological, behavioral, surgical, medication, and other medical services to support a person’s gender identity. “Public bodies” are defined to include state and local governments, commissions, or boards established by the state and any branches of state government, such as school districts and universities, that receive state funding. “Reproductive health care” is defined as medical, behavioral, pharmaceutical, or surgical services bearing on a person’s reproductive system. A non-inclusive list of such services includes pregnancy prevention, abortion, managing stillbirth or miscarriage, managing menopause, managing infertility, treating reproductive tract cancers, and prevention or treatment of sexually transmitted infections.

⇒ **The bill restricts local communities or governments from attempting to stop abortions or “gender affirming care” within their jurisdictions.**

- Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham already signed HB 7, the Reproductive and Gender-Affirming Healthcare Act, into law. It prohibits public bodies from discriminating against individuals seeking reproductive and gender-affirming healthcare.
- There are two towns, Clovis and Hobbs, and two counties, Lincoln and Roosevelt, that have passed ordinances that have placed barriers to

clinics that provide abortions from obtaining a business license. Currently, there are no clinics that perform abortions anywhere in eastern New Mexico. But after the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe, some towns and counties in eastern New Mexico began to consider these ordinances.

- Otero County was the first to take action by passing a resolution making Otero County a so-called “sanctuary for the unborn” county in July of last year. Alamogordo quickly followed suit by passing a similar resolution and passing a second resolution supporting Otero County’s resolution. Such resolutions can be effective in sending a signal to a prospective clinic that it would face hostility.
- The new state law will enable individuals to sue public entities, such as municipalities and counties, for discrimination and carry fines of \$5,000 or actual damages, whichever is greater. The law also allows the plaintiff to collect attorney’s fees if the plaintiff is successful in their suit.

⇒ **Republican efforts to add sensible amendments protecting minors and necessitating parental consent were struck down.**

- Republicans tried to amend the bill on the House floor multiple times. Minority Floor Leader T. Ryan Lane, R-Aztec, introduced two amendments. The first amendment would have limited HB 7 to only apply to an emancipated minor or individuals 18 years or older. Lane expressed concern about children disclosing a desire for pharmaceutical gender-affirming care or a 10 year-old girl needing an abortion and confiding in a teacher rather than a parent. That amendment failed 44 to 23.
- Serrato said it was an unfriendly amendment and that teachers are already expected to report a crime or talk to the child’s parents. She added that it is “important to acknowledge children are people as well.”
- Lane’s second attempted amendment would have inserted conscientious objection for abortion care for teachers. That amendment failed 43 to 24. Serrato said it was an unfriendly amendment and that it would prevent individuals from getting the healthcare they need.

- State Rep. Rod Montoya, R-Farmington, tried to amend the bill to require parental consent if a child under the age of 18 seeks an abortion or gender-affirming care. Serrato said that was also an unfriendly amendment because research shows that “efforts to enforce parental notification often has the opposite effect” and said that being able to access care can reduce drug usage and be “life saving.”
- “This bill primarily deals with discrimination, so this would be logrolling,” Serrato said. Logrolling refers to when a bill attempts to address multiple topics within one piece of legislation.
- That amendment failed 44 to 25.
- State Rep. Cathrynn Brown, R-Carlsbad, tried to amend the bill to include language that would require standards of care for abortion to be applied to “surgical clinics, maintain the same level of medical malpractice insurance as clinics that provide obstetrics and gynecology, that abortion facilities would have to employ emergency care staff and equipment on site or admitting privileges at a nearby hospital and that an abortion clinic will provide 24-hour medical care.”
- Serrato called that amendment unfriendly and said that abortion clinics are highly regulated, like all standards of care.
- That amendment failed 44 to 23.

Hamblen co-sponsored a failed “gun-grab” bill that would have restricted firearm purchases in the state by raising the legal age to not just purchase but also possess certain firearms. If Hamblen had her way, she would lock up teenagers who go hunting with their dads in rural New Mexico.

⇒ Introduced January 16, 2024, [HB 127](#) - An act relating to firearms; establishing a minimum age of twenty-one to purchase or possess an automatic firearm, a semiautomatic fire or a large-capacity ammunition feeding device; providing exceptions; providing a penalty.

⇒ HB 127 prohibited those under 21 from buying or possessing firearms with very limited exceptions.

- “House Bill 127 (HB127) amends Section 30-7-2 NMSA 1978, to prohibit those under 21 from buying or possessing automatic or semiautomatic firearms and large-capacity magazines, with specific exceptions. These exceptions include usage in firearm safety courses, target shooting at ranges, organized competitions, performances, legal hunting or trapping, and transit to these activities with unloaded firearms. Additionally, under supervision, those under 21 can possess such firearms on private property controlled by a parent, grandparent, or legal guardian. The bill exempts peace officers and armed service members and makes selling or transferring these firearms to individuals under 21 years of age, outside these exceptions, a misdemeanor.”

⇒ Law makers called it a “gun grab”, and out of touch with rural New Mexico. Hamblen’s legislation would have made **outlaws of youth hunters, sportsmen, and 4h programs**. Hamblen says the current laws in New Mexico are not consistent, **“This isn’t meant to try and put any particular group in a disadvantage than any other group**. Really what is happening is that our state’s laws when they were formed in terms of the age to buy a weapon were not consistent in the first place. We’re just trying to make that even across the board”.

2018 New Mexico Statutes
Chapter 31 - Criminal Procedure
Article 19 - Sentencing Authority for Misdemeanors
Section 31-19-1 - Sentencing authority[;]
misdemeanors; imprisonment and fines; probation.

- A. Where the defendant has been convicted of a crime constituting a misdemeanor, the judge shall sentence the person to be imprisoned in the county jail for a definite term less than one year or to the payment of a fine of not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) or to both such imprisonment and fine in the discretion of the judge.
- B. Where the defendant has been convicted of a crime constituting a petty misdemeanor, the judge shall sentence the person to be imprisoned in the county jail for a definite term not to exceed six months or to the payment of a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500) or to both such imprisonment and fine in the discretion of the judge.
- C. When the court has deferred or suspended sentence, it shall order the defendant placed on supervised or unsupervised probation for all or some portion of the period of deferment or suspension.

⇒ **This legislation died in committee.**

⇒ **This was not Hamblen’s first attempt to strip citizens of their rights to own a firearm. [SB 116](#) introduced and sponsored by Hamblen in 2023 sought to take away rights of citizens under 21 to own firearms. It is safe to say that Senator Hamblen is against our constitutional rights to own a gun.**

Hamblen voted twice to criminalize carrying a firearm in a polling location or 100 feet from it.

- ⇒ On February 15, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted for SB 44](#), which would [create the new crime](#) of carrying a firearm in a polling place.
- “Senate Bill 44 creates the new crime of unlawful carrying of a firearm at a polling place, a petty misdemeanor, punishable by up to six months in jail. Unlawful carrying of a firearm at a polling place is defined as carrying a loaded or unloaded firearm within 100 feet of a polling place on Election Day or while early voting is in progress. The prohibition does not apply to peace officers in the course of their duties or peace officers and security personnel with authorization from local government officials to be stationed in the area.”
- ⇒ **The bill passed the Senate but did not progress in the House.**
- ⇒ **In 2024, the legislation was reintroduced as SB 5 and Hamblen [voted](#) for it.**
- ⇒ **The governor signed the bill and it is now in effect.**

Hamblen voted to institute a seven-day waiting period on firearm purchases.

⇒ On February 10, 2024, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for [HB 129](#), which created a seven-day waiting period for the purchase of a firearm.

- “The House Floor amendment #1 to the House Judiciary Committee substitute for House Bill 129 (HB129) shortens the waiting period from 14 to 7 calendar-days for firearm sales. This period includes the time needed to conduct a federal instant background check. The bill stipulates that the firearm must remain with the seller until the waiting period ends and the background check is complete.” ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))

Hamblen supports assisted suicide and thinks killing yourself is “humane.” She sponsored the “End of Life Options Act” to legalize assisted suicide, which has been criticized for making it harder for people of color and people with disabilities to obtain appropriate medical care.

- ⇒ **[SB 308](#) – In 2021 Hamblen sponsored and passed a law making it legal for physicians to assist individuals in their efforts to commit suicide.**
- ⇒ **Hamblen rejoiced at the approval of this vote stating that she was casting her vote in honor of her friend Cheryl.**

State Sen. Carrie Hamblen, D-Doña Ana, voted in favor of the bill this year exactly one year to the day after the death of her friend, Cheryl Swannack, a Las Cruces artist, producer and community activist who suffered from Parkinson’s Disease.

“I cast my vote in honor of Cheryl,” Hamblen said.

“Cheryl loved New Mexico. It was her home,” Hamblen said in a Facebook post. “Although she shared a wonderful life with her partner, Nancy, in Washington D.C. ... Cheryl would have loved to have taken her last breath in her New Mexico home. But, because we didn’t have any Death with Dignity provisions/laws in the state, she couldn’t.”

Swannack, 73, died March 15, 2020 in Washington, D.C.

⇒ In an interview with the *Albuquerque Journal*, Hamblen was asked about her stance on assisted suicide. Hamblen said “allowing someone to die with dignity is one of the most humane things we can do”.

⇒ Matt Valliere, executive director of the Patients Rights Action fund opposed all such legislation. He said that “ legalized assisted suicide in any form will only make it harder for people with disabilities, people of color, and the economically disadvantaged to obtain quality medical care”. Because this law is intact, insurance companies can cover medically assisted suicide instead of more expensive cures to an illness.

⇒ By passing this legislation, Hamblen has forced private companies to allow breaches of contracts. Companies that provide life insurance policies cannot deny claims by individuals that participated in this act even though they did in fact commit suicide.

SECTION 8. [NEW MATERIAL] MEDICAL AID IN DYING--EFFECT ON WILLS--CONTRACTS--LIFE INSURANCE--ANNUITIES.--

A. A provision in a contract, will or other agreement, whether written or oral, or life insurance contract or annuity, to the extent the provision would affect whether a person may make or rescind a request for medical aid in dying medication, is not valid.

B. An obligation owing under any currently existing contract shall not be conditioned or affected by an individual making or rescinding a request for medical aid in dying.

C. It is unlawful for an insurer to deny or alter health care benefits that would otherwise be available to an individual with a terminal illness based on the availability of medical aid in dying, or to otherwise attempt to influence an individual with a terminal illness to make or not make a request for medical aid in dying medication.

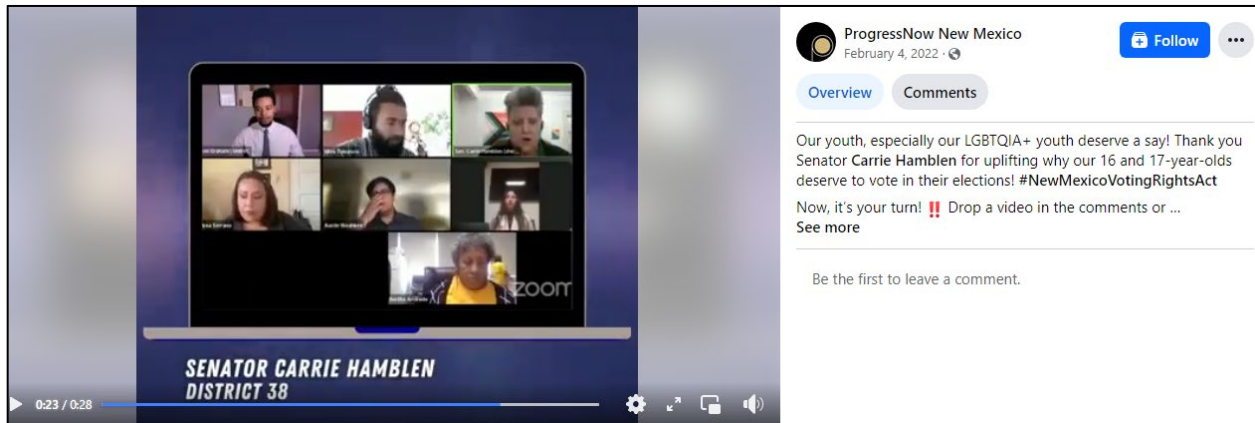
B. If a qualified resident submits a voter registration certificate in accordance with the provisions of Subsection A of this section and pursuant to the requirements of Section 1-4-8 NMSA 1978, the qualified resident shall:

- (1) become a regular local election voter upon the qualified resident's sixteenth birthday; or
- (2) be considered a regular local election voter for the purpose of participation in a regular local election, special local election and municipal election where the qualified resident will turn sixteen on or before the day of the regular local election, special local election or municipal election.

C. For the purposes of this section, "regular local election voter" means a qualified resident who has registered in accordance with the provisions of this section, met the conditions specified in Subsection B of this section and is therefore qualified to vote in all elections subject to the provisions of the Local Election Act."

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE.--The effective date of the provisions of this act is January 1, 2022.

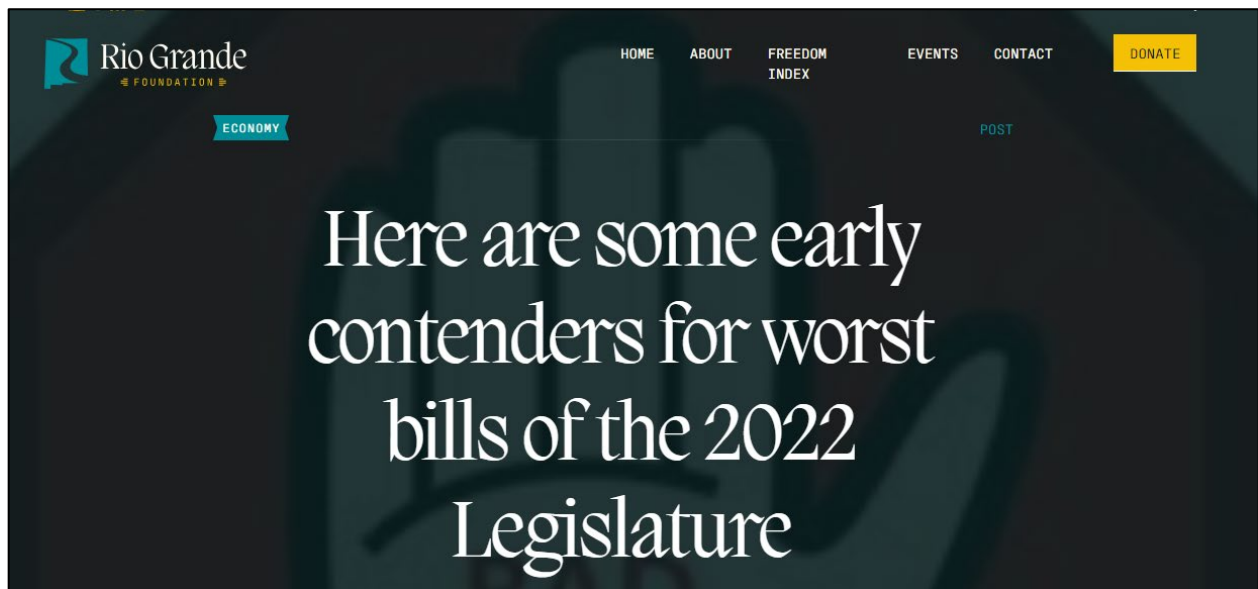
⇒ **Similar legislation to Hamblen’s takes voter registration to another extreme level.**

Another bill, [S.B. 14](#) from Sen. Linda Lopez (D-Bernalillo), seeks to register people to vote without their knowledge any time they make a change to their Motor Vehicle Division records and then make them go through the burden of filling out a card saying they would not want to vote and sending it back to their local county clerk. This would allow these 16-year-olds, many of whom are eligible for licenses, to be automatically added to the voter rolls, adding more opportunity for voter fraud with each voter who is unaware they have automatically been registered to vote.

Dark money groups likely see the implementation of these extreme bills to boost their political advantage in certain close elections by adding thousands of more voters, which can be easily manipulated at their impressionable young age. Hamblen’s proposal mimics others being sponsored by far-left politicians, including “Squad” member in the U.S. House of Representatives, Rep. Ayanna Pressley (D-MA). who has repeatedly [sponsored](#) the radical measure.

Hamblen wants to make voting fraud easier. Hamblen voted for a bill that significantly weakens election integrity by establishing automatic voter registration, a permanent absentee voter list, same-day registration, and requires secure ballot drop boxes. It also restricts the public's ability to see voter data.

⇒ On March 8, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for [HB 4](#), the “Voting Rights Protections” Act, which establishes automatic voter registration, a permanent absentee voter list, same-day registration, and requires secure ballot drop boxes.

- “House Bill 4 makes numerous updates and changes to the Election Code, including expanding automatic voter registration, restoring a convicted felon’s right to vote upon release from prison, creating a voluntary permanent absentee voter list, and enacting the Native American Voting Rights Act. Changes are summarized by Sections, along with the effective date of each grouping of sections.”
- Sections 2 and 7-9 (section numbers as amended by SRC): Address agency-based voter registration (AVR) which automatically registers confirmed qualified electors who prove their citizenship at the Motor Vehicle Division (MVD). Each elector receives a mailer allowing the elector to opt out of registration, or confirm party affiliation after the fact. Individuals who do not provide documentation of citizenship are still allowed to affirm their citizenship and register at MVD. Existing registrant addresses would be updated to match an address change made at MVD. SOS is authorized to expand AVR to additional state agencies, including Human Services Department and Indian nations, tribes, or pueblos. These changes are effective July 1, 2025.
- Section 3 (section number as amended by SRC): As amended by SRC, removes provisions allowing for expanded access to voter information, and prohibits the transferring, copying, sharing, or conveying of special voter data lists, voter data or mailing labels except as provided in the Election Code. Such data cannot be made accessible by the public on the internet or through other means. This restriction is effective July 1, 2023.

- Section 4: Addresses provisions relating to same day registration at a polling place and clarifies that this option shall be available to all voters for the duration of in-person (early) voting through election day. It also clarifies the voter identification requirements at the polling location applicable to a qualified elector participating in the same day registration process. These provisions are effective July 1, 2023.
- Sections 5-6: authorizes a person convicted of a felony to be able to register immediately before and vote upon release from incarceration. A voter convicted of a felony remains ineligible to vote while in a correctional facility (now defined in Subsection E by SRC amendment), but the right is reinstated upon release after registering or updating an existing registration. These provisions are effective July 1, 2023.
- Section 10 (section number as amended by SRC): amends the Absent Voter Act to provide for a permanent absentee voter list. A registered voter may request to be placed on a list maintained by the county clerk to receive a mailed ballot for every election without having to first submit an application for each upcoming election (as current law requires). Voters on this list would be mailed a reminder notice prior to being sent the ballot. If the notice or other piece of election mail is returned undeliverable then the voter would not be mailed a mailed ballot. A voter also may be removed if a voter fails to return a mailed ballot in two consecutive elections, a registration is cancelled, or if a voter has moved outside of the county, or has requested to be removed from the list. These provisions are effective January 1, 2024.
- Section 11 (section number as amended by SRC amendments): mandates a minimum of two of secured containers in be available in each county. It also provides that a political subdivision of the state (a municipality, school district, or community college) may make a written request to the county clerk for one or more monitored secured containers on or near the boundaries of the political subdivision, and allows for an appeal to SOS in the event of a denial. The SRC amendments provide a process by which a county clerk may seek a waiver, due to geographic or security constraints in that county, of this new requirement. These provisions are effective July 1, 2023. ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))

Hamblen voted to impose restrictions on trapping wildlife on public land (including the numerous parks in New Mexico). - “SB32/aSCONC would enact the Wildlife Conservation and Public Safety Act, which would make it unlawful to use a trap, snare, or wildlife poison on public land. It establishes a variety of exceptions with specific requirements. The bill provides for misdemeanor penalties for violations of the Wildlife Conservation and Public Safety Act.”

⇒ **The bill passed and was signed into law, but faced opposition from groups that claimed that it was an overreach that was fueled by “emotional propaganda” and not in line with “science-based wildlife management.”**

DESPITE OUTCRY, NEW MEXICO LOSES PUBLIC LAND TRAPPING

Highlights

Why it Matters: On April 5, 2021, New Mexico Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham signed [Senate Bill 32](#) (SB 32) into law, banning trapping on public lands in the state. Not only is this decision based on emotional propaganda founded by misinformation, it is also a devastating blow to science-based wildlife management in the state and the [North American Model of Conservation](#). Despite being a tough loss for the sporting community, SB 32 is a perfect example of how powerful sportsmen and women can be when we rally together.

- If you have been following along this legislative session, New Mexico has been consistently in the headlines, with the Congressional

Sportsmen’s Foundation (CSF) reporting on the state [not once, not twice but four separate times](#). The New Mexico regular legislative session ended on April 9, following a few big wins for the outdoor sporting community and one big loss in the form of SB 32.

- Erroneously titled the Wildlife and Public Safety Act, SB 32 bans all [trapping](#) on public lands with minimal exceptions including Government agents working to resolve public safety issues, scientists conducting bona fide research, and Native Americans who are trapping for ceremonial or religious purposes.
- From the very beginning of session, the New Mexico pro-trapping and science-based wildlife management community faced a monumental uphill battle. Years in the making and extremely well-funded, the proponents of SB 32 anticipated an easy win, but thanks to the dedication and sweat equity of a [broad coalition of over 25 conservation partners](#), we did not go down without a fight. Despite a chaotic democratic process that lacked transparency, adamant **science-based opposition from the outdoor sporting community, farming and livestock industry, and landowners at every turn, words of caution from the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish**, and an online petition that garnered over 19,000 signatures, SB 32 passed out of the House by the skin on its teeth (35-34). Sixteen days later, Governor Lujan Grisham quietly signed SB 32 into law, 4 days before the end of session deadline.
- While the battle for science-based wildlife management in New Mexico is not over, CSF will continue to work to ensure sportsmen and women are included in discussions surrounding implementation of SB 32. While this was a heavy loss for the outdoor sporting and agricultural community, CSF was proud to be a part of a diverse and dedicated coalition of conservationists and thanks everyone who participated in the fight to save trapping on public lands in New Mexico.
- Studies conducted at both the state and federal level have found that the number of hunters and trappers have been on a generally declining trend over the past several decades. To increase recruitment, retention, and reactivation (R3) of hunters and trappers, which initiative do you think would have the greatest impact?

Hamblen sponsored a radical transgender “rights” bill that forces any government entity or organization who receives any government funding to follow the transgender agenda, including forcing women and girls to share bathrooms and private spaces with biological men. The bill does not allow any religious or moral exceptions and is therefore an attack on religious freedom. The bill enables discrimination lawsuits against contractors based on “gender identity.”

⇒ **HB 207-** Carried by Hamblen in the senate was entitled the “Expand Human Rights Act”.

⇒ **HB 207 added "gender" and "gender identity" to human rights law, prohibiting discrimination by public contractors.**

- “House Bill 207 makes changes to the Human Rights Act (Section 28-1 NMSA 1978) to add government agencies as among those who cannot discriminate against a person based on a wide variety of personal

characteristics. Gender identity and gender are among those factors, gender being added in several places in this bill.”

- “Section 2 amends Section 28-1-7 NMSA 1978, which is entitled “Unlawful Discriminatory Practice.” In several places in its text, the word “handicap” is replaced with “disability,” and adds “gender” to the list of attributes which an employment agency or an institution providing funding for housing cannot use to discriminate against a person. Like financial institutions and employment agencies, government entities and public contractors cannot discriminate against a person on the bases of sex, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, presence of a physical or mental disability, pregnancy, childbirth or other condition related to pregnancy or childbirth, serious medical condition or spousal affiliation, according to a new Section 1M added to the act.” ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))

⇒ **The law claims to modernize the existing law outlawing her perceived views of discrimination by any government entity or organization that receives funding from the government.**

- ⇒ In an opinion piece published by the [Albuquerque Journal](#), Senate Bill 63 voted in favor of by Hamblen, "will deliver secrecy, and perhaps racism and cronyism".

On Wednesday, the New Mexico Senate voted 31-9 to pass a bill that will deliver secrecy, and perhaps racism and cronyism. It is incumbent on state representatives to honor their constituents and kill Senate Bill 63 ASAP when it gets to the state House. If the bill actually

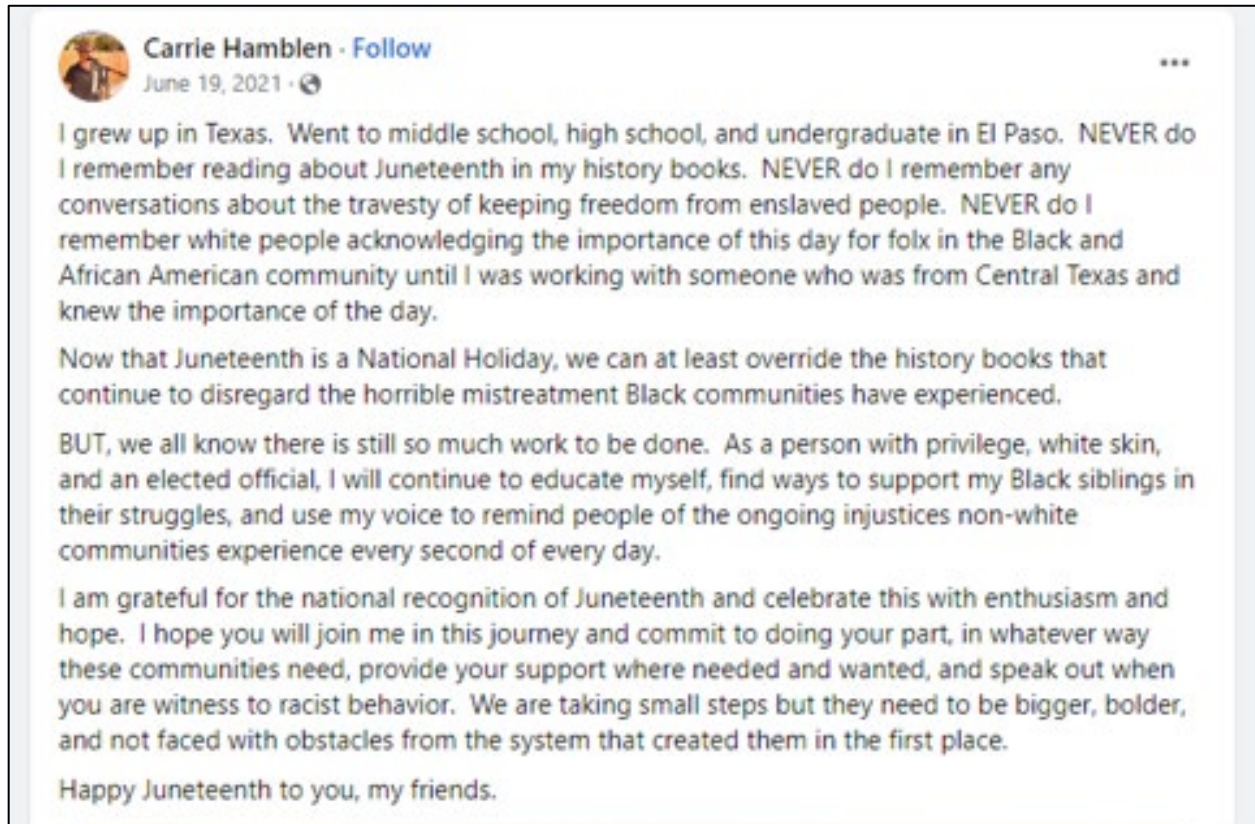

What Are the Weed Trafficking Consequences in Texas?

The Texas Controlled Substances Act states that importing or delivering marijuana is a crime in the state. According to Section 481.120, trafficking up to 7 grams is a Class B misdemeanor if the person received no payment, and a Class A misdemeanor if the person received payment. A Class A misdemeanor attracts up to 1 year in jail, a fine less than \$4,000.00, or both, while a Class B misdemeanor attracts a maximum of 180 days in jail, a \$2,000.00 fine, or both.

If the amount is more than 7 grams but up to 5 pounds, the offender faces a state jail felony charge punishable by a fine of up to \$10,000.00 and 180 days to 2 years in jail. Offenders trafficking over 5 pounds but not more than 50 pounds face a second-degree felony, punishable by a fine of up to \$10,000.00 and 2 to 20 years in jail. Furthermore, selling or delivering any quantity of marijuana to a child or someone in secondary school is a second-degree criminal offense (Section 481.122).

A first-degree felony involves marijuana more than 50 pounds but less than 2,000 pounds, and is punishable by 5 years to life in prison, and a fine up to \$10,000.00. Any quantity more than 2,000 pounds attracts 10 years to life in prison and a fine of up to \$100,000.00.

Interim President Gogue and the NMSU Board of Regents,

During the month of June, in towns and cities all across the country, the LGBTQI+ community celebrates PRIDE, recognizing the contributions queer individuals have had on our history, and emphasizing the need for more protections, safety, and fairness in all aspects of life. And yet, since January, over 560 anti-trans laws have been introduced in state legislatures. These laws attack the safety and mere existence of trans individuals. According to the Trevor Project, a queer person will consider suicide every 45 seconds. I'd like that to sink in....every 45 seconds.

Which is why I, along with the public leaders and legislators below, are writing to express our extreme disappointment in New Mexico State University with the speaking event that involved Matt Walsh in April.

As a self-proclaimed "Transphobe of the Year" and for repeatedly encouraging violence, minimizing accusations against known pedophiles and child abusers, and for spouting racist and pro-slavery rhetoric, it is shocking that NMSU would allow him to have a public event on the Las Cruces campus.

And to add to the already horrific list of qualities Walsh possesses, he was quoted on March 31st, 2023 as saying "all of us today would be in a worse spot if slavery never existed at all across the entire globe because a change that significant would likely shift the course of events in a way that would mean none of us would even exist. It would mean a world full of other people who are not us."

Through our involvement in the community as leaders and advocates, we know these values are not shared by the majority of residents in Las Cruces or the students of NMSU. And yet, we find ourselves confused that the NMSU administration would still ignore the harmful effects this type of speech would have on the student body. In the statement from the university, "NMSU encourages free expression and peaceful assembly. The university also realizes that certain speech may have a negative impact on some members of our community" is an acknowledgement that harm will be inflicted upon a particular group of students. Adding that "NMSU offers resources to help, including walk-in counseling services at the Aggie Health and Wellness Center" recognizes that this violent speech will hurt your students and negatively impact their mental health.

There is no disagreement to the right to free speech and the need to hear diverse points of view. However, studies show that trans people are more likely to experience mental health struggles, including anxiety, depression, PTSD, and thoughts of suicide, than cisgender people. Welcoming a speaker who spouts harm and violence to a portion of the student population is contradictory to the NMSU values of "Supporting the education of our students through every aspect of our university, every day."

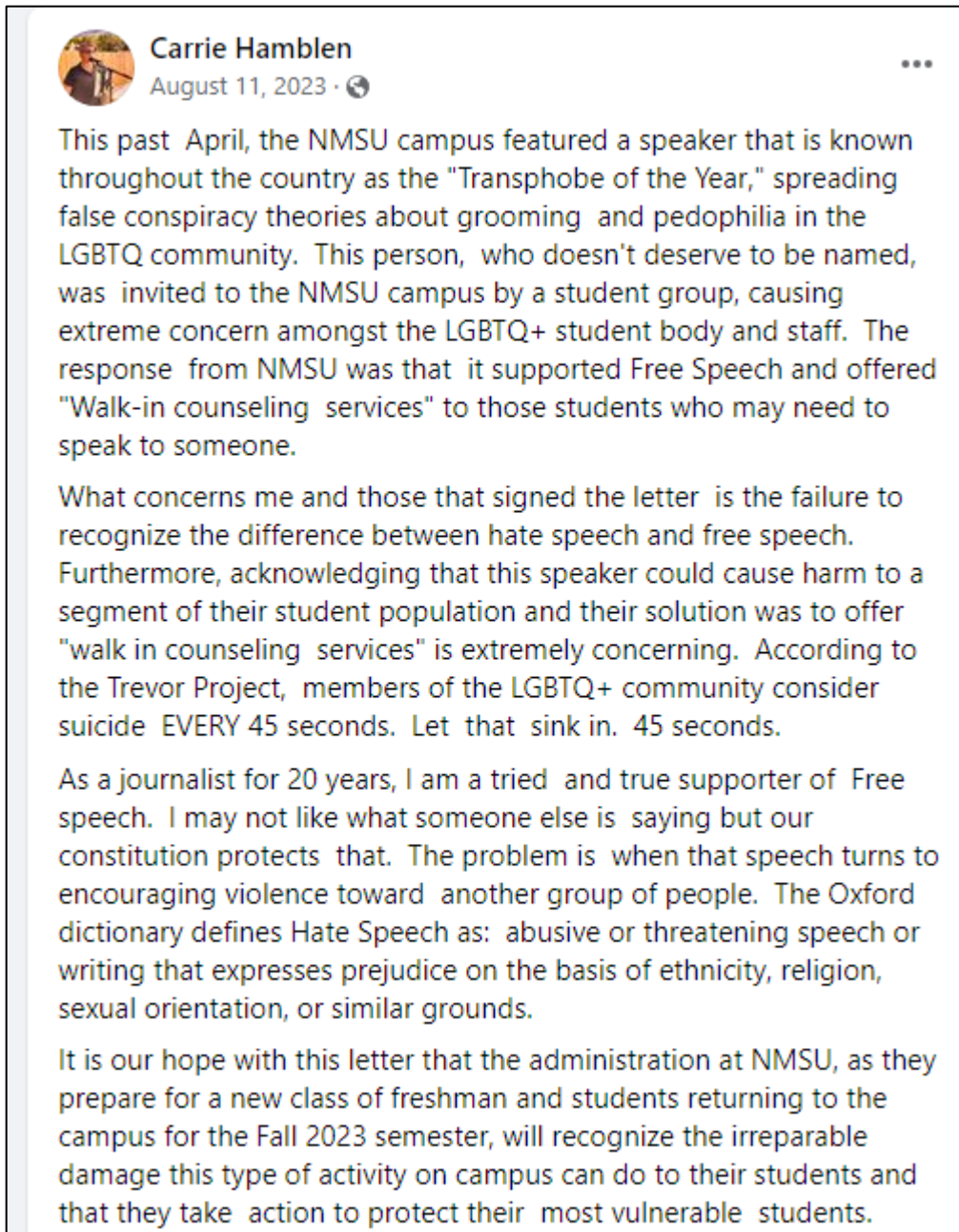

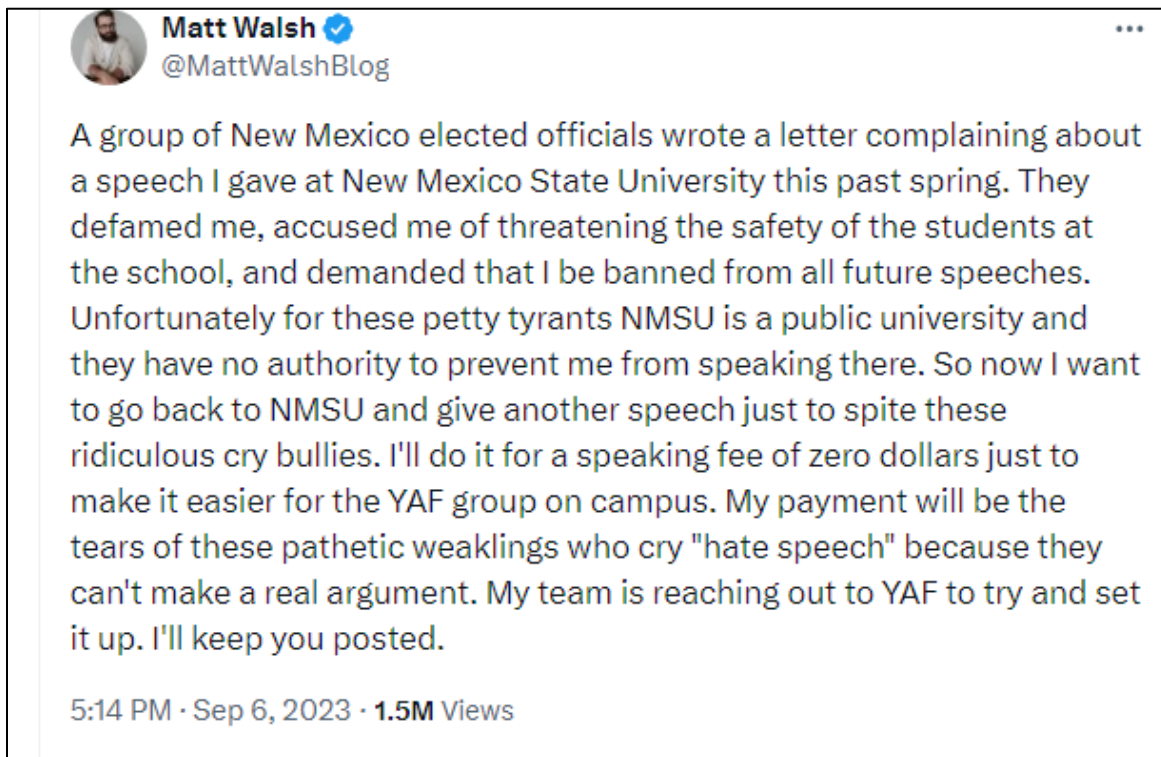



The letter also cited [House Bill 207](#), which mandates that the state's Human Rights Act be applicable to all New Mexico government entities, institutions, cities, counties, and public contractors. This bill includes definitions for sex, gender, gender identity, disabilities, and sexual orientation within the Human Rights Act.

Hamblen voted to weaponize New Mexico Attorney General's Office against conservatives by creating a new “civil rights division” in the AG’s office. The legislation passed but was pocket vetoed by the Democrat governor.

- ⇒ On March 13, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for SB 426
- ⇒ According to the [fiscal impact report](#) prepared by the Legislative Finance Committee, SB 426 creates a civil rights division in the Attorney General's office to investigate alleged civil rights violations.
 - “Senate Bill 426 contemplates creating a new civil rights division within the NMAG. The bill would authorize NMAG to investigate civil rights violations, bring civil actions for the violations, issue investigative demands, and collect information and make policy recommendations. The division would be staffed subject to legislative appropriations.
 - Statute currently protects civil rights through the Human Rights Act and the Civil Rights Act. Both acts generally rely on private enforcement. The Human Rights Commission’s has authority to encourage the elimination of prejudice through voluntary conciliation and persuasion conferences, but, aside from this, there is no official enforcement.”

Hamblen voted to codify and fund school-based health centers. Conservatives criticize the lack of parental control and lack of local district control.

⇒ On February 27, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for SB 397.

⇒ [SB 397](#) codified school-based health centers to provide healthcare and authorized the Dept. of Health to fund the SBHCs. According to the [Fiscal Report](#):

- “Senate Bill 397 (SB397) creates a new section of the Public Health Act to codify school-based health centers (SBHCs) in state law. The bill directs the Department of Health (DOH) for SBHCs funding, technical assistance, and clinical oversight. SB397 provides rule-making authority to DOH for the establishment of a fund for distribution.”

⇒ **The governor signed the law.**

⇒ **Republicans criticized the lack of parental and local control.**

- SB 397, School-Based Health Centers, sponsored by state Sen. Nancy Rodriguez, D-Santa Fe, would not change the way School-Based Health Centers already operate in the state. The local school district as well as the individual school determine if the school will have a School-Based Health Center and decide what provider the school will contract with. Republicans have expressed concern over this bill, saying **that parents do not receive notification for reproductive healthcare and that the districts do not have local control.** (New Mexico Political Report, [03/06/2023](#))
- Some Republicans argued that the bill would, if enacted, create situations in which students were receiving healthcare without consent of their parents or guardians.
- “So children can walk to the doctor’s office without mom knowing because it shall be on campus or where there’s a crossing guard....**Again, no mom. Why do we not want mom in this? This confuses me why we don’t want mom,**” State Sen. Bill Sharer, R-Farmington, said. (New Mexico Political Report, [02/28/2023](#))

Hamblen voted to create a “Diversity Equity and Inclusion” (DEI) Commission to create plan to “transform public education” in New Mexico.

- ⇒ On March 8, 2021, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for SB 148, which creates a commission to promote diversity, equity, and inclusion in public schools.
- ⇒ According to the [Fiscal Impact Report](#), the bill proports to “transform public education” in light of DEI.
- “Senate Bill 148 (SB148) creates the Commission on Diversity, Equity, and Excellence in Education composed of 27 executive-level, legislative, and public members who will meet between 2021 and 2025 to develop a long-term plan to transform public education in New Mexico.”
- ⇒ **The bill passed the Senate but there was no vote in the House.**

More woke bureaucracy. Hamblen voted to establish State Chief Diversity Officer and to address “Institutional Racism” in state agencies.

- ⇒ On February 28, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for SB 226, “the Diversity Act”.
- ⇒ [SB 226](#) established a Chief Diversity Officer and required each government agency to address “institutional racism” and implement DEI initiatives. From the [Fiscal Impact Report](#):

Synopsis of SFC Amendment to Senate Bill 226

The Senate Finance Committee Amendment to SB226 strikes the appropriation.

Synopsis of Original Bill

Senate Bill 226 (SB226) appropriates \$250 thousand from the general fund to the State Personnel Office (SPO) to enact and carry out the provisions of the proposed “Diversity Act.”

Sections 1 and 2 provide a title and definitions that include, among others, "council" to mean the workforce diversity and inclusion council; "institutional racism" to mean the actions that result in differential access to goods, services and opportunities; "protected class" to mean a group legally protected from discrimination; "state employees" as subject to the Personnel Act; and "workforce diversity" to mean recruiting from a diverse population to secure a high-performing workforce.

Section 3 creates the "chief diversity officer" (CDO) tasked with creating a culture of equity, equality, and inclusion, and collaborating with agencies in assessing barriers and developing strategies to: recruit and retain a diverse workforce; increase awareness of and support for equity, equality and inclusive values; establish and maintain agency-specific strategic plans and best practices for leading diverse groups; create strategies to recruit from underserved communities; and conduct evaluations to track progress against the required provisions in the bill.

On or before December 31 each year, the CDO will develop policies to prevent inequities in hiring, pay, and promotion; develop anti-institutional racism trainings; and track progress toward ending institutional racism. Such trainings will include strategies to eliminate cultural prejudices and discrimination; improve engagement with employees, customers, and contractors from different backgrounds; and counteract unconscious bias to foster a climate of diversity and inclusion.

Section 4 requires the CDO to convene the "workforce diversity and inclusion council" composed of liaisons from agencies. The liaisons will implement recommendations proposed by agencies and CDO. The CDO will ensure job advertisements and personnel reviews reflect commitments to eliminating institutional racism, and ensure employees receive anti-institutional racism training.

Section 5 requires by July 1 each year, agencies to submit a report that includes an assessment of anti-institutional racism in hiring, promoting and pay equity, including for contractors and nongovernmental and other organizations that win bids or obtain contracts; accommodations for employees with disabilities; and data-driven approaches to address solutions for the problems identified, including proactive measures to address equity and inclusion in the workforce.

This section also requires the CDO to submit an annual report each year to the governor and Legislature and for it to be part of the annual budget request and request for proposals submissions for each agency. In addition to posting on the SPO website, copies are to be maintained in the Legislative Council Service library, state library, as well as in the State Records and Archives.

Section 6 requires each agency to maintain a diversity, equity, and inclusion strategic plan.

⇒ **The legislation passed the Senate but did not progress in the House.**

Hamblen voted for a new gross receipts tax on businesses. The new tax seemingly affects only Taos County.

- ⇒ On March 10, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for SB 205.
- ⇒ [SB 205](#) allows counties to impose a new 0.5% tax on businesses to fund hospital projects.
- ⇒ According the [Fiscal Impact Report](#) the new tax only effects Taos County.
 - Senate Bill 205 adds a new 0.5 percent local option hospital gross receipts tax to the County Local Option Gross Receipts and Compensating Taxes Act. This authorization is likely restricted to Taos County. This tax requires a positive referendum. The proceeds of the tax, if authorized by the voters, would be divided as follows:
 - 25 percent for use of the nursing program at UNM/Taos; and
 - 75 percent to be used to service a maximum 10-year bond for constructing or renovating various hospital facilities and grounds in Taos County.
 - This bill defines an eligible county as follows:
 - "County" means a class B county with a population of less than thirty-seven thousand according to the most recent federal decennial census and a net taxable value for property tax purposes of more than one billion five hundred ninety million dollars (\$1,590,000,000) but less than two billion dollars (\$2,000,000,000).
 - LFC staff estimate only Taos County qualifies.
- ⇒ **The bill passed and became law.**

Hamblen voted to decrease election transparency.

- ⇒ On February 25, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for SB 180.
- ⇒ Among other things, [SB 180](#) made it harder for voters to verify if a candidate lives in their jurisdiction by allowing the redaction of their addresses.
 - “Add a new section to the Election Code allowing SOS to adopt rules allowing an elected or appointed public official to designate the official’s home address as confidential in election and financial disclosures filed with SOS or a county clerk (and therefore not subject to release pursuant to the Inspection of Public Records Act nor available on a governmental website);” ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))
- ⇒ **The bill passed and became law.**

Hamblen voted for new health insurance mandates, prohibiting insurance plans from charging for sexually transmitted diseases or infections (STD/Is). Conservatives opposed this overreach due to speculation it will raise insurance premiums, undermines parental consent and was unfair to people with other medical conditions who have to pay.

- ⇒ On February 27, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for SB 132.
- ⇒ [SB 132](#) prohibits insurance plans from charging for STD treatments.
 - “The Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee substitute for the Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee substitute for Senate Bill 132 (SB132) applies to each type of health insurance product the requirement that prevention and treatment of sexually transmitted infections (STIs, defined in the substitute as a contagious infectious disease usually transmitted through sexual activity, but regardless of its mode of transmission to a given person) be available to those covered without coinsurance (defined as including policy deductibles, copayments or coinsurance). The coverage and lack of cost-sharing applies whatever the person’s gender identity. Unless federal law specifies otherwise, coverage for treatment of sexually transmitted infections provided according to the previous parts of the bill is to be excluded for high deductible health care plans with health savings accounts until a covered person's deductible has been met.
 - In addition, the bill as substituted specifies that persons of any age can consent to examination, preventive care, and treatment for STIs.
 - SB132 applies these requirements to the Health Care Purchasing Act; individual or group health insurance policies, healthcare plans, or certificates of health insurance that are delivered, issued for delivery, or renewed in New Mexico; blanket or group health insurance policies, healthcare plans, or certificates of health insurance; individual or group health maintenance organization contracts; and individual or group healthcare plans that are part of nonprofit healthcare plans.

-
- Section 6 amends Section 24-1-9 NMSA 1978 to add the requirement that people of all ages can seek and consent to preventive measures, as well as examination and treatment of STIs.”

⇒

Several Republicans opposed the measure:

- “State Rep. Stefani Lord, R-Sandia Park, [said](#) she could not support the bill because it wasn’t fair to cancer patients, individuals with dementia and individuals living with AIDS.
- “Two Republicans who voted against the bill were state Sen. Gregg Schmedes of Tijeras, and state Sen. David Gallegos of Eunice. Schmedes [said](#) the bill would drive a wedge between children and parents and that it “facilitates more control for healthcare insurance companies.”
- “They grab up premiums,” he said.
- Gallegos expressed a similar concern regarding minors not having to receive consent from a parent or legal guardian to seek testing and treatment.

Green New STEAL. Hamblen voted to mandate EV charging Stations in a move that would result in increased housing costs, as well as strain on power grids.

⇒ On February 22, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted for SB 77](#).

⇒ SB 77 increased the cost of housing by requiring that new home builds include electric charging stations estimated at roughly \$2,000 on average. The bill was originally much more demanding before an amendment was added. From the [Fiscal Impact Report](#):

- “One of the proposed Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee amendments strikes the word “include” from page one, line 12 and replaces it with “offer.” Rather than requiring all new residential construction to include photovoltaic systems, all new residential construction would offer photovoltaic systems. The amendment also adds the word “require” to the same line, making electrical receptacles for charging electric vehicles a requirement.
- The final STBTC amendment strikes the word “have” and replaces it with “offer” on page 2, line 1, revising the bill to read “All new residential construction after July 1, 2023 shall offer photovoltaic systems installed that provide at least one watt per square foot of heated area.
- The amendments soften the requirements for the Construction Industries Licensing Act from new residential construction mandating the installation of photovoltaic systems to make the installation optional. While the requirements for the inclusion of photovoltaic systems is softened, the amendment keeps consistent a requirement for electrical receptacles for charging electric vehicles on new residential construction. Kelly Blue Book estimates \$2,000 as the ballpark figure for parts and installation of a level two charger in a residential garage, a cost that may be offset by rebates or incentives offered at state and local levels, or through utility providers. The amendments to the bill will likely reduce the impact of costs on new home builds compared to the

original version which required the inclusion of photovoltaic systems on all new residential home builds.”

⇒ **Builders mentioned concerns about the power grid:**

Those connections to the larger power grid are also a concern.

“We actually have a number of subdivisions in Albuquerque where you probably wouldn’t be able to put these in anyway, there isn’t enough capacity in the lines in the whole system,” Milarch said.

Char Ullman is an educational anthropologist at the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP), where she is an associate professor of the sociocultural foundations of education. Her work focuses on identities and ideologies in education, exploring the impact of globalization and neoliberalism through the use of critical ethnographic methods. She has published in cultural anthropology, migration studies, applied linguistics, cultural studies, adult education, and educational anthropology journals. In 2014, she co-authored the book *The Globalization and Corporatization of Education: The Limits and Liminality of the Market Mantra* with Deni Blum, and in 2015, she co-authored *Methods for the Ethnography of Communication: Language in Use in Schools and Communities* with Judith Kaplan-Weinger. Her most recent book, *Graduate Students Becoming Qualitative Researchers An Ethnographic Study*, co-written with Kate Mangelsdorf and Jair Muñoz (Char is first author) was published by Routledge in 2020. With her most recent project now in print, she is laying the groundwork for her next project, which will be a critical, comparative, ethnography of policy study. Texas is a “no promo homo” state, which means that public school teachers are forbidden from portraying LGBTQ people in a positive light. It also has an anti-bullying policy that does not specify which groups are protected and often ends up punishing the students who have been bullied. Meanwhile, next door in New Mexico – not “no promo homo” state – a gender inclusive schools policy was recently instituted to create an educational environment free of discrimination for all students, regardless of sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression. Also, Las Cruces Public Schools has a policy to protect the safety of all students, regardless of gender or sexuality. Char wants to understand what these disparate policies look like on the ground, through studying the lived experiences of students, faculty, and administrators at one high school in El Paso, Texas and another in Las Cruces, New Mexico. Her goal is to investigate how these disparate policies shape everyday life in schools.

“A lot of other programs look specifically at race and racism in terms of black and white,” Char Ullman, educational anthropologist in the Department of Teacher Education at UTEP, said.



That certainly applies for the program she helped create. Yet, the approach for the 100% online [M.A. in Education With a Concentration in Diversity, Equity and Social Justice](#) was much broader.

⇒ **The program offers an array of courses in the woke genre**

- ““One of the things we wanted was to create a program that looked at race and racism, but also other kinds of oppressions,” Ullman said. “For example, we have a course in feminism transnational and post-colonial feminism. We have a class in critical disability studies. We have a class

in environmental racism. We have a class in queer theory and pedagogy, critical race theory and a field that's called LatCrit, which is Latinx criticism along the lines of critical race theory.

- “We wanted it to look at more than one aspect of identity.”

⇒ **The program was inspired in part by the “murder” of George Floyd.**

- “Developing the diversity, equity and social justice program occurred at the same time other major events were happening.
- “The murder of George Floyd happened at the same time that we were already in the process of creating this program,” Ullman said. “It was certainly an impetus and many students in the program have told us that they applied to the program because of George Floyd's murder.
- “But what the program adds really is how it reflects trends that are happening in the field of education around equity and social justice. The idea of the program was to shine a light on social inequities and the oppression of people of color and other groups in the United States. That's been dealt with in education for quite a long time, but this program brings all of that work together and we hope it'll help to inform folks who are becoming teachers, leaders and researchers in a variety of fields.”

⇒ **The program, being an education degree, helps to spread the woke virus to other educational institutions.**

- The M.A. in Education With a Concentration in Diversity, Equity and Social Justice is still a young program at the time of publishing.
- However, it has attracted a great deal of attention, perhaps most notably from potential employers. One example is how a college in California sought out graduates of UTEP's program for a position as director of social justice. There weren't any graduates to refer at such an early stage in the degree program.
- The demand from students has already exceeded expectations. At the onset, “...when there wasn't much advertising, we hoped we would get like five or 10 students,” Ullman said. “Instead, so many fabulous

people applied we couldn't wait to accept that we had to start a second start time. We now have a fall start and a summer start."

- Before the first year of the program has even come to a close, there are approximately 70 students enrolled in the degree. There is a lot of diversity in terms of race, ethnicity, sexuality and gender, as well as professions.
- Ullman noted how students include a policy analyst in Austin, another who runs a racial justice program at the YWCA in Pennsylvania and a student who is the head of migrant education for the State of Texas. There are bilingual teachers, special educators and math, science and history teachers. Others include nurses, physical therapists and those in sports medicine.
- "It's really exciting," Ullman said. "Students in the program have told me that courses have been really transformative, both in their thinking and their actual practice."

- I. Introduction: definition and background on high school proms as a heteronormative ritual in high school in the United States.
- II. Thesis statement: queering high school proms disrupts heterosexual norms and gender binaries (i.e., heterosexual norms and gender binaries are two key ideas that will support the argument).
- III. Two ideas from the literature to support thesis:
 - a. schooling and the heterosexual matrix
 - b. gender trouble

- IV. Conclusion: Gender trouble provides a theoretical lens to inform subversive action, such as queering proms to disrupt the hegemonic effects of the heterosexual matrix on identities, practices, and discourses that are made available in traditional high school rituals.

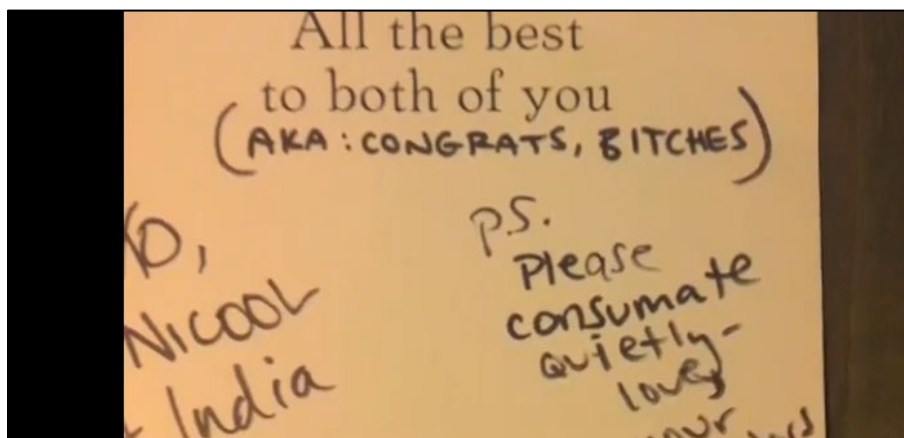

Hamblen was sued by the New Mexico Educational Assistance Foundation for failing to pay back her student loans in 2009. Since joining the State Senate, Hamblen has voted to use taxpayer dollars to cover tuition for undergraduate students of any public or tribal college in New Mexico.

⇒ **SB 140 is a scholarship program to cover all tuition and fees for undergraduate degree seeking individuals of any public or tribal colleges in New Mexico. Hamblen voted for the bill.**

Under SB140, a scholarship to cover all tuition and fees would be provided to all degree-seeking undergraduate students of any public state or tribal college in New Mexico who take between six and 18 hours during the fall and spring semesters and maintain a 2.5 grade point average. Students enrolled in certain credit-bearing certificate programs would also be eligible for the scholarship, so long as the certificate programs were approved by the Higher Education and Workforce Solutions Departments. The scholarship would also cover tuition and fees for those students during the summer semester, so long as they took between three and nine credit hours.

The scholarship would cover tuition and fees for a maximum of 90 credit hours toward an associate degree and 160 credit hours for students working toward a bachelor's degree. There is no maximum hour cap provided for certificate-seeking students. Generally, associate degrees require 60 hours to complete, and bachelors require 120 hours, so the scholarship would cover the required courses to get those degrees plus 33 to 50 percent more courses in addition.

Students would become ineligible for the scholarship if they stopped out or dropped out for a semester or did not maintain a 2.5 grade point average. Therefore, the scholarship would not be available for students who received the scholarship for a few semesters, stopped out, but returned later as adult students. The effective date of this bill is July 1, 2022.

In 2023, Hamblen voted to give politicians a pay raise, including a 53% pay-raise the Democrat governor. - [SB 442](#)- Signed by the governor on April 4, 2023, provided major pay increases to statewide elected officials. According to the [Fiscal Impact Report](#) provided by the LFC, the estimated additional cost to New Mexico’s general fund for each elected official is more than the median household income for the state which was \$58,722.00 according to the census bureau from 2018-2022.

Hamblen voted to expand bureaucracy with the addition of an entirely new health agency, the New Mexico Healthcare Authority.

⇒ **On March 6, 2023, Carrie Hamblen voted for [SB 16](#), which creates the New Mexico Healthcare Authority, combining powers of various departments.**

- “Senate Bill 16 (SB16) proposes to amend the Human Services Act, Sections 9-8-1 to 9-8-14 NMSA 1978 to rename the Human Services Department (HSD) as the Health Care Authority Department (HCAD). Beginning July 1, 2023, all statutory references to HSD will be considered references to the HCAD.
- The bill proposes the governor be given authority to issue an executive order to further delineate the organizational structure, power, and duties of HCAD and move divisions and programs to or from other departments. The bill would require DFA, HCAD, DOH, GSD, the governor’s staff, and other persons assigned by the governor to develop a transition plan and proposed statutory changes.
- SB16 also requires the governor to report reorganizational changes and recommend statutory changes to the Legislative Health and Human Services Committee and the Legislative Finance Committee by November 1, 2023, and provide a final reorganization report to the Legislature by January 1, 2024.
- In addition, among other changes, SB16 calls for the following two additional agencies to be administratively attached to the proposed HCAD—the Group Benefits Committee (currently at the General Services Department) and the New Mexico Health Policy Commission (not operating currently, but administratively attached to the Department of Finance and Administration). The bill also adds four new divisions to the proposed HCAD—an office of the secretary, the developmental disabilities division (currently at Department of Health), the health improvement division (currently at the Department of Health), and the state health benefits division (currently at the General Services Department).

- The bill would also remove the current bonding requirement for the secretary, directors, and other employees and officers of the department. SB16 would also transfer all of HSD’s contractual obligations, and all of HSD’s existing rules, to the proposed HCAD. SB16 would repeal Sections 9-8-13 and 9-8-14 as well as Laws 2019, Chapter 211, Section 1. The bill makes several grammatical and other minor clean up changes to the act.”

⇒ **The bill passed and became law.**

Hamblen is an abortion and “trans rights” extremist. She voted to make New Mexico a sanctuary state for abortion and “gender affirming care” — obstructing legal action directed at providers from other states.

⇒ **On March 10, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted for SB 13](#), prohibits releasing information about abortions to assist out-of-state investigations. The bill passed and became law.**

- “Senate Bill 13 would protect providers of reproductive care or gender-affirming care from civil or criminal liability and discrimination by the licensing boards of their specialties and by other states where activities protected in New Mexico are not protected.... Section 4 establishes similar restrictions on release of information subject to foreign (meaning out-of-state) subpoenas. People or entities served with such a subpoena violating this act must notify the issuing court and the moving party that they will not comply unless the defect is cured. Remedies are prescribed for false attestations from parties, with a statutory penalty of \$10 thousand.” ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))

NM would remain a safe haven for abortion and trans health care under approved bill

- Following an hours-long debate, the New Mexico House passed a bill Friday to protect those who provide or seek abortions or gender-affirming care in the state. The measure would enshrine in law safeguards for out-of-state patients and clinicians issued by executive order after the U.S. Supreme Court overturned *Roe v. Wade*.
- New Mexico neighbors several states with strict limits on abortion care and, last June, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham declared the state a safe haven for reproductive health care providers and patients from elsewhere, including refusing possible extradition attempts for care provided within New Mexico.

- “As long as I’m Governor, everyone in the state of New Mexico will be protected,” she said at a news conference announcing the executive order. “And abortion is and will continue to be legal, safe and accessible.”
- A bill now awaiting her signature would ensure those safeguards from discipline or criminalization remain in place regardless of who’s governor. It would do the same for trans people seeking transition-related care and those who provide it.
- “This is affirmatively protecting what we’re seeing with egregious and predatory laws that are being passed across the country, where they’re trying to criminalize care,” said Rep. Andrea Romero (D-Santa Fe) while introducing the bill on the House floor.
- There have been 90 bills that ban gender-affirming care for minors introduced across the country this year, according to the Human Rights Campaign. And NPR reports five Republican-led states have signed such bans into law.
- Senate Bill 13 also builds on Lujan Grisham’s executive order. It shields people and organizations from having their information related to this care shared electronically in a way meant to harass, humiliate or intimidate them. Making someone fear for their own or their family’s safety in this way would also violate the act.
- A person who believes their rights under this law have been violated would be able to sue in district court for relief and damages or \$10,000 per violation, whichever is greater.
- More than half of the over 3-hour debate was taken up by Rep. Rod Montoya (R- San Juan). He eventually introduced a failed amendment to remove these protections for “entities,” such as clinics, while maintaining them for individuals.
- “This goes too far,” he said of protecting entities. “No business is free of harassment. They can be harassed.”
- He argued the provision could infringe on the free speech rights of those who organize protests against abortion clinics on social media or by group chat.

Hamblen isn't "pro-choice" she is actively pro-abortion – she voted to direct millions of tax dollars to fund abortions in New Mexico. The \$10 million in taxpayer money helped fund the center which "is set to include basic gynecological care, contraception, gender affirming care, miscarriage management, abortion and preventative care."

⇒ On March 15, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for [HB 505](#), was a capital projects bill that appropriated \$10 million to plan, design, and construct a reproductive health clinic in Dona Ana county.

⇒ **"The center is set to include basic gynecological care, contraception, gender affirming care, miscarriage management, abortion and preventative care."**

A new reproductive health clinic on Wednesday got the go-ahead from the University of New Mexico's Board of Regents to move forward with its building plans. The group planning the clinic can now purchase land for it.

The state approved \$10 million last year for a reproductive health center in Doña Ana County. Since then, UNM and Planned Parenthood along with local advocacy organizations Bold Futures New Mexico and Strong Families New Mexico have worked together and engaged other community groups to form a plan for the center.

Heather Smith with Bold Futures said this will help fill a large gap in services in Southern New Mexico.

"Our communities have been lacking reproductive services for decades," she told the UNM Board of Regents. "Often, we have to travel an hour to El Paso, or several hours to Albuquerque or Santa Fe, to get to receive the services that we need."

The center is set to include basic gynecological care, contraception, gender affirming care, miscarriage management, abortion and preventative care.

Hamblen voted for steps towards a socialized medical system.

- ⇒ **On March 16, 2023, Carrie Hamblen voted for [HB 400](#), the “State-Administered Health Coverage Plan” which authorizes the Secretary of Human Services to develop and implement a state-administered health care plan upon completion of a feasibility study.**
- “The House Floor amendment to the House Appropriations and Finance Committee substitute for House Bill 400 removes the provisions creating and implementing the Medicaid Forward state administered health coverage plan. The amendment leaves in the study of the feasibility, creation, and implementation of the Medicaid Forward plan. The amendments clarify the study shall consider the operation needs and effects of implementing the Medicaid Forward plan, as well as the fiscal effects on recurring and nonrecurring spending in the state budget.” ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))
- ⇒ **The bill passed and became law.**

Hamblen voted for taxpayer-funded health care for illegal immigrants.

⇒ On March 18, 2021, Carrie Hamblen voted for [HB 112](#), which made illegal immigrants eligible for healthcare under the state indigent care programs.

Hamblen voted to increase the surtax on health insurance premiums by 2.75%

⇒ On March 15, 2021, Carrie Hamblen voted for [SB 317](#), which largely prohibited co-pays for behavioral health, but also increased the Insurance Premium Surtax 2.75% to fund a new health care affordability fund.

⇒ The tax was added as an amendment and was described in the [Fiscal Impact Report](#):

- “House floor amendment #1 to Senate Bill 317 adds the contents of House Bill 122, Health Insurance Premium Surtax, as amended by HAFC and the House floor which establishes a “health care affordability fund” and raises the health insurance premium surtax by 2.75 percent.
- House Bill 122’s proposed health care affordability fund would be funded with a 55 percent distribution of revenues from the health insurance premium surtax, which the amendment proposes to raise from 1 percent to 3.75 percent. The health care affordability fund would be used to reduce healthcare premiums and cost-sharing for New Mexico residents who purchase health insurance through the state’s health insurance exchange, provide resources for the development and implementation of healthcare initiatives for uninsured New Mexico residents, reduce premiums for small businesses and their employees purchasing healthcare coverage in the fully insured small group market, and provide resources for the administration of healthcare initiatives for uninsured New Mexico residents. The healthcare affordability fund could also be used to maintain health insurance coverage for New Mexico residents with incomes below 200 percent of the federal poverty level in the event the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act is repealed or struck down.”

⇒ **The bill passed and was signed into law.**

Hamblen voted to spend \$50 million on new bureaucracy to fund tourism marketing.

⇒ **On March 10, 2023, Carrie Hamblen [voted for HB 377](#), which establishes a marketing excellence bureau in the Department of Tourism to market services of other executive agencies.**

- “House Bill 377 appropriates \$50 million to the Tourism Department for the purpose of creating a marketing excellence bureau. The bill creates a new section of the Tourism Department Act, establishing a marketing excellence bureau. The bureau would serve as a central marketing arm for all the state’s executive agencies. It would also provide guidance and training related to marketing efforts, support strategy alignment and develop efficiencies, assist agencies in developing new market strategies and technology solutions. The bureau would lead asset creation and advertising placements for the Economic Development Corporation, and for all executive branch agencies and marketing and public education programs. Finally, the legislation amends the Economic Development Corporation Act to deem it an executive branch agency for purposes of receiving marketing services from the Tourism Department.” ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))

⇒ **The bill passed and became law.**

Green bureaucracy. Hamblen voted to create mandated state office to promote the development and production of renewable energy.

⇒ **On March 9, 2023, Carrie Hamblen voted for HB 95, which mandates the State Land Office create an office to promote the development and production of renewable energy.**

- “The House Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Committee Substitute for House Bill 95 (HB95/HENRCS) mandates the State Land Office create and maintain a renewable energy office to advance the production and development of renewable energy. This bill does not contain an effective date and, as a result, would go into effect June 16, 2023, (90 days after the Legislature adjourns) if signed into law.” ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))

⇒ **The bill passed and became law.**

Hamblen voted for up to \$20 million a year in financing for private “environmental sustainability” projects.

- ⇒ On February 16, 2022, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for HB 7.
- ⇒ **[HB 7](#) created a review board that would provide up to \$20 million a year through FY 24 for economic development opportunities that are environmentally sustainable.**
 - House Bill 7, the Opportunity Enterprise Act, creates the opportunity enterprise review board that would work in conjunction with the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) and the Economic Development Department (EDD) to provide financing, leases, loans, and revolving funds to applicants who qualify...
 - “The estimated additional operating budget table reflects \$300 thousand to \$20 million annual fiscal impact, assuming at a minimum some monies for the board would be necessary, and at a maximum the revolving fund would require appropriations. This analysis uses appropriations made to the local economic development act fund (LEDA), which makes similar awards, to assume appropriations to the revolving fund.
 - The General Appropriations Act (GAA) includes a total of \$40 million for business space development and research and development for the Economic Development Department... This bill creates a new fund and provides for continuing appropriations. The LFC has concerns with including continuing appropriation language in the statutory provisions for newly created funds, as earmarking reduces the ability of the Legislature to establish spending priorities.” ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))
- ⇒ **Final legislation text defined “economic development opportunities” as “the advancement of an environmentally sustainable economic development goal of the state as determined by the authority.”**
 - “D. "economic development opportunities" means the advancement of an environmentally sustainable economic development goal of the state as determined by the authority, in coordination with the department,

and includes the creation of jobs, the provision of needed services and commodities to diverse communities across the state and the increase of tax and other revenue collections resulting from the enterprise development project;" ([Fiscal Impact Report](#))

⇒ **The bill passed and became law.**

More green regulations. Hamblen voted for to use taxpayer funds for a grant program to make low-income homes more energy efficient.

⇒ **On February 15, 2022, Carrie Hamblen [voted](#) for [HB 37](#), which created a grant program to make buildings in low-income communities more energy efficient.**

- “House Bill 37 creates a community energy efficiency development (CEED) block grant program in the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department (EMNRD). Counties, municipalities, Indian nations, tribes, or pueblos, and the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority (MFA) may apply for CEED grants for community energy efficiency projects. Such projects are defined as those that make improvements that reduce energy consumption, energy-related operating costs, House Bill 37/aHENRC – Page 2 or the carbon intensity of energy consumption to residential buildings in underserved communities.
- The grant program would be administered by EMNRD’s Energy Conservation and Management Division (ECMD), which will be responsible for: evaluating and prioritizing applications; determining whether a person or household qualifies as low-income; assess the affordability of residential housing value, rent, or estimated mortgage; and make grants and enter into contracts with grantees to implement selected projects. HB37 lays out criteria ECMD must consider when selecting community energy efficiency projects for grants. HB37 creates the community energy efficiency development block grant fund to carry out the purposes of the legislation, including administrative costs of ECMD, subject to appropriation by the Legislature.”

⇒ **The bill also added new regulatory language :**

The bill also adds language to the PUA directing PRC to promulgate responsive rules concerning energy and water equity, to include:

- 1) Rules requiring each electric public utility to
 - a. provide a cost/benefit and feasibility analysis of providing “all prudent energy efficiency improvements” to 50 percent of low-income households by 2030, and to 100 percent of low-income households by 2050;
 - b. determine the affordability of utility rates and identify low-income discount rates that, along with energy efficiency improvements, the utility would recommend to make electric service affordable; and
 - c. identify changes to utility policies, PRC rules, orders, or statute to ensure universal access to essential household services, energy affordability, reduced energy burden, and continuous energy access for low-income New Mexicans;
- 2) Rules requiring each public water and wastewater utility to provide a cost-benefit and feasibility analysis of providing adequate water service to 50 percent of low-income households by 2030 and to 100 percent of low-income households that desire such service by 2050;
- 3) Rules making reasonable and consistent progress toward access to essential household services, energy affordability, and reducing energy burden with a goal of achieving 50 percent energy affordability for low-income customers by 2030 and 100 percent energy affordability by 2050;
- 4) Rules making reasonable and consistent progress toward improving access to water and wastewater service, with a goal of providing adequate water service to 50 percent of all households by 2030 and 100 percent of all households that desire that service by 2050.

⇒ **The bill passed and became law.**

In 2021 and again in 2022, when gas prices were soaring, Hamblen voted to codify clean fuel standards to lower emissions, by setting the goal of reducing greenhouse gas emissions in the state to 20% below 2018 levels by 2030 and 30% below 2018 levels by 2040. The bills also lay the groundwork for regulatory rules intended to help the state meet these goals.

⇒ **On March 11, 2021 Carrie Hamblen voted for [SB 11](#), a "clean fuels standard" to reduce the carbon intensity of transportation fuels, using a "carbon credit" scheme. According to the [Fiscal Impact Report](#):**

- The Senate Finance Committee substitute for Senate Bill 11 would enact the Clean Fuel Standards Act and proposes a clean fuel standard (CFS) using performance- and market-based incentives to reduce the carbon intensity of transportation fuels. SB11/SFCS directs the Environmental Improvement Board (EIB) to adopt a CFS that applies to transportation fuels, requiring that such fuels meet the following reductions in carbon intensity (CI) values: a reduction of the CI of transportation fuels in New Mexico by a minimum of 10 percent from 2018 levels by 2030 and by a minimum of 28 percent from 2018 levels by 2040. After 2040, the EIB shall determine further reduction requirements and timeframes for achieving them. The CFS would only apply to fuels used in motor vehicles and businesses that produce or import those fuels (referred to as "providers" in the bill).
- SB11/SFCS defines "carbon intensity" as "the quantity of fuel lifecycle emissions per unit of fuel energy, expressed in grams of carbon dioxide equivalent per megajoule." The Environment Department (NMED) explains that CI "is calculated by a life-cycle analysis that estimates the greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions for the fuel over its entire life cycle, including emissions from producing, processing, transporting, storing, and burning the fuel."
- SB11/SFCS directs NMED to petition the EIB to enact rules implementing the CFS within 24 months of the effective date of the legislation. The central mechanism for implementation established by

the bill is a system, to be developed through rulemaking, whereby individuals can earn “credits” by reducing eligible GHG emissions and may sell those credits to providers who are in a “deficit” – providers of a transportation fuel that has a CI greater than the applicable standard. A credit and a deficit are each equal to one metric ton of carbon dioxide equivalent.

- The bill requires the EIB’s rules to establish a fair market for credit transactions, managed by NMED or a third party. The market would be governed by EIB rules, which will enable credits to be traded or saved by providers for future compliance periods. Providers would demonstrate compliance with the CFS by balancing credits and deficits annually and submitting “fuel pathway” applications, fuel transactions, and CI data to NMED. “Fuel pathway” is defined in the bill as “a detailed description of all stages of production and uses for a transportation fuel...that is used to calculate the fuel lifecycle emissions of a transportation fuel.”

⇒ **SB 11 passed the Senate but stalled in the House.**

⇒ **On February 3, 2022, Carrie Hamblen voted for [SB 14](#), largely identical to SB 11. SB 14 [proposed](#) to establish a lean fuel standard with goals to reduce greenhouse gas emissions to 20% below 2018 levels by 2030 and 30% below 2018 levels by 2040.**

- “The Senate Finance Committee substitute for the Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee substitute for Senate Bill 14 (CS/CS/SB14/aSFC/STBTC) would enact the Clean Fuel Standards Act and proposes a clean fuel standard (CFS) using performance- and market-based incentives to reduce the carbon intensity of transportation fuels. CS/CS/SB14/aSFC/STBTC directs the Environmental Improvement Board (EIB) to adopt a CFS that applies to transportation fuels used in New Mexico, requiring that such fuels meet the following reductions in carbon intensity (CI) values: a reduction of the CI of transportation fuels by a minimum of 20 percent from 2018 levels by 2030 and by a minimum of 30 percent from 2018 levels by 2040. The CFS would only apply to fuels used in motor vehicles (including special mobile equipment, such as forklifts) and businesses that produce or import those fuels (referred to as “providers” in the bill).”

⇒ **While SB 14 passed the Senate it was defeated in the house by a tie vote.**

Hamblen voted to expand the scope of public employee unions, by changing the definition of certain research park corporations to make them public employers for collective bargaining purposes.

⇒ **On February 5, 2022, Carrie Hamblen voted for [SB 41](#), which changed the definition of certain research park corporations to make them public employers for collective bargaining purposes.**

- “The Senate Floor amendment to Senate Bill 41 strikes the Senate Judiciary amendment and instead adds language specifying that a research park corporation shall be deemed a public employer “if it owns, operates or manages a health care facility or employs individuals who work at a health care facility.” This amendment would make both UNM’s Sandoval Regional Medical Center, Inc., and the UNM Medical Group, Inc., a physician practice organization, subject to the state the Public Employees Bargaining Act rather than the federal National Labor Relations Act as they currently are. No other university research park corporations would be held to the changes in Senate Bill 41.”

⇒ **The bill limited how a research park corporation could not be deemed a government entity/agency in some ways (A) but does deem them to be in other ways (B), including as “a public employer for the purposes of the Public Employee Bargaining Act.”**

⇒ **The bill passed and became law.**

Hamblen voted to raise the minimum wage for state employees and contractors to \$15 an hour.

- ⇒ **On February 11, 2022, Carrie Hamblen [voted for SB 7](#), requires all public employees and government contractors to be paid at least \$15 per hour.**
- “The Senate Finance Committee substitute for Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 7 (SB7) establishes a minimum wage of \$15 per hour for all state, public education, public charter school, and higher education employees. The salary increases shall be effective the first full pay period after July 1, 2022.”
- ⇒ **While the bill passed the Senate, it did not progress in the House.**

Hamblen voted to subject government employees to mandatory “implicit bias” training.

⇒ On March 14, 2021, Carrie Hamblen voted for [SB 230](#), titled “institutional Racism in State Agencies,” which requires state [employees to undergo training](#) on implicit bias, cultural diversity, and inclusion.

- “The Senate Judiciary Committee (SJC) amendment to Senate Bill 230 (SB230) adds language to the bill specifying the State Personnel Office must provide anti-institutional racism training to all employees subject to the state Personnel Act, which includes

(1) A historical perspective on New Mexico, spotlighting the many racial and ethnic populations that live and work in New Mexico and the need for all New Mexicans to be aware of, appreciate, and celebrate the cultural differences alive in the state;

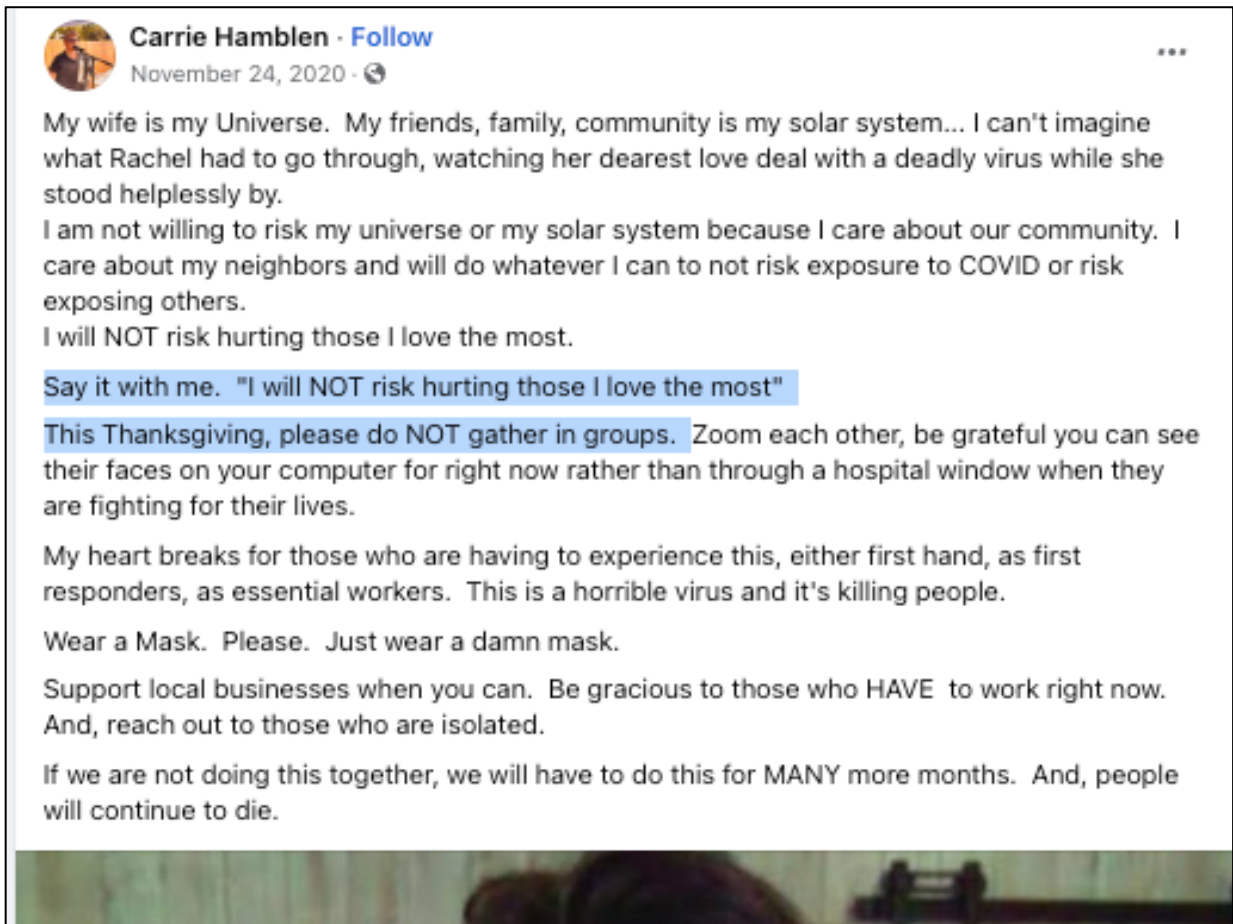
(2) Strategies that eliminate cultural prejudices and discrimination while strengthening the common threads that bind individuals into one state and one nation;

(3) Strategies that improve engagement with employees, customers, or clients from different cultural backgrounds; and

(4) Strategies that counteract unconscious bias and foster a climate of diversity and inclusion in the state government workplace.”

⇒ **The bill passed the Senate but stalled in the House.**

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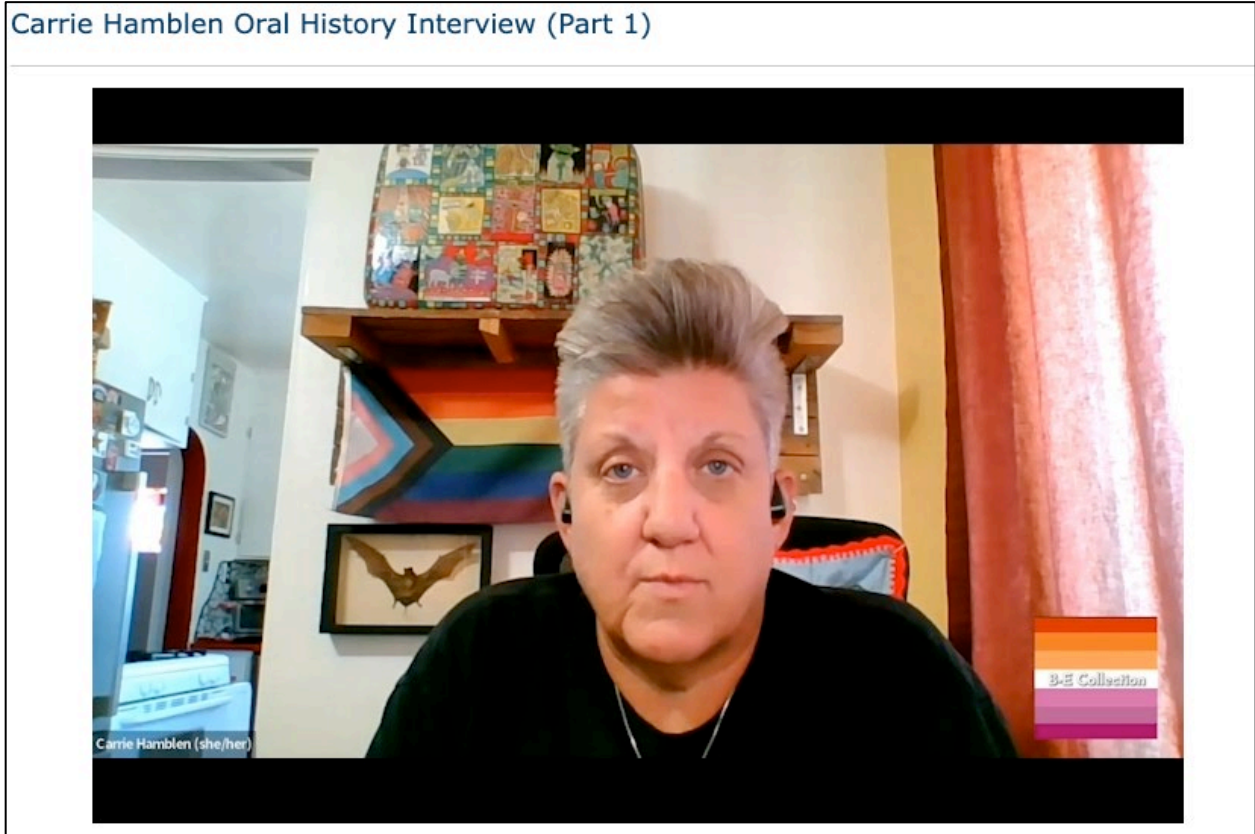

- “I gotten a job as a student employee at the public radio station, because I got my undergraduate degree in broadcast journalism. And so started working and going to graduate school and having a one bedroom apartment and with my girlfriend and, and then started trying to navigate being a person who was on the air. So I was at the public radio

station, I was started out as a classical music host, and then worked my way up to being the morning news anchor for Morning Edition. And then the operations manager and, and hosting my own program. And I was really trying to figure out how to be active in LGBTQ causes, but not jeopardizing my role as a journalist. So I would do a lot of behind the scenes stuff. For example, for example, I helped get the anti discrimination clause on the books at the state by organizing and providing support for volunteers who are talking to people. So I publicly couldn't talk to people about the issue. You know, in my capacity as a journalist, I did do interviews, for my public affairs program on those things, but I was always really cognizant of how to make sure that I didn't blur those lines. And but then, after a while, people started getting to know me, as you know, Carrie, she's the gay one."

Hamblen said she ran for senate because she didn't want to run for house, which would mean going before voters every 2 years instead of every 4. It has been reported that Hamblen only plans to serve two terms and will "groom" a Latina to take her place in 2028.

- And our PFLAG chapter was has is still in over 30 years, it's been in existence, still very active in the community, and very, a very much a go to organization when it comes down to making sure that the queer voices heard. And so um, but you know, I also had to walk a fine line as a journalist, I could not really have an opinion. I wasn't supposed to. And I took that very seriously. So I was always very careful about what hat I was wearing. But you know, a lot of the work that I did was political. But it wasn't until 2015, that I thought about running for office.

- And you know, in like most legislatures, you have a House of Representatives and the Senate, and the house terms are two years apart. Two years, and then senators are four years. And given that I came from Public Radio, where I was fundraising twice a year, I didn't want to do that in a two year spot, because that's really what you're doing the entire time, as a rep, you are campaigning and fundraising and trying to legislate at the same time, which is, I don't know how they do it.
- And so I knew I wanted to go for a Senate position. But at the time, the person who was in this position was a woman who had been there for 16 years at the time. By the time I defeated her, it was 20 years. And she had some concerning votes, I have a great deal of respect for her. Her name is Mary Kay Palin, and a great deal of respect for what she's done, especially regarding mental health issues. But there were some things that she was, she was pretty old fashioned about, you know, we had a law on the books... but some of her votes were very concerning. So in New Mexico, we had a law on the books that dated back to 1969, that criminalized women who chose to get abortions and the people who provided them, we also did, and we had, you know, efforts to legally legalize adult use cannabis and expunge the records of people who have been arrested for two ounces or less a possession, which our criminal justice system and the systemic racism there, it's pretty much black and brown men. And we also have a permanent land grant fund, which is funded by oil and gas reserves. And that's a \$19 billion fund. And we can use educate people about all this, say, you know, you're trying to get people to support you vote for you, etc.

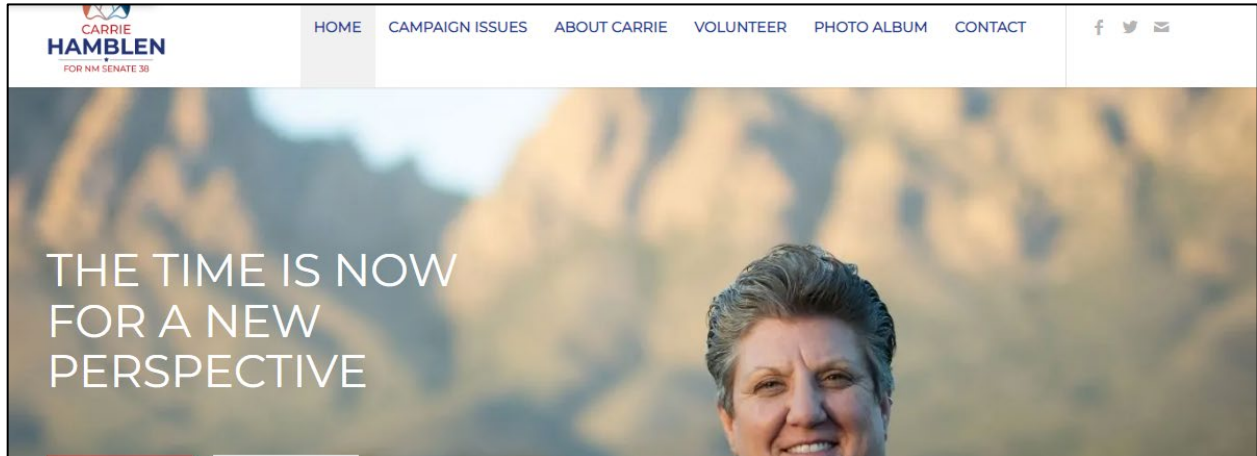

What steps should the Legislature take to ensure New Mexico has a balanced budget amid falling oil prices and an economic downturn prompted by the coronavirus outbreak? I believe the Legislature, unfortunately, must first revisit the funding of new programs and determine if lessening that funding will help. Next, they need to move forward on diversifying our revenue stream and not be so heavily dependent on oil and gas revenues.

What more, if anything, should the Legislature do to address a court ruling that found New Mexico is failing to provide a sufficient education to all students? The Yazzie/Martinez case was instrumental in highlighting the deficiencies in our educational system. There are elements of the ruling that have been addressed but the legislature needs to prioritize the remaining issues, develop a timeline for action, and conduct follow up on the effectiveness of those actions.

What changes, if any, should New Mexico make to its gross receipts tax code? We should make the GRT rate uniform across the state. GRT's penalize sole proprietors and small businesses and although they provide a stable source of revenue, there are other ways to help fund the state. I would prefer the GRT be removed and implement a fair form of taxation.

Do you support or oppose legalizing recreational marijuana use in New Mexico and taxing its sales? I support the legalization of recreational marijuana as it can provide much needed jobs, can be regulated, and communities can benefit from the taxation. Plus, by legalizing it, we can stop criminalizing people of color and focus more on incarcerating those with legitimate crimes.

In recent years, New Mexico has steadily increased spending on early childhood programs, such as home visiting, prekindergarten and child care assistance, and created a new early childhood trust fund. Do you support or oppose a constitutional amendment that would withdraw more money from the Land Grant Permanent Fund to increase funding for early childhood services? I support a constitutional amendment that would go to the voters to determine withdrawing money from the Permanent Fund. The fact that this opportunity was removed from the residents of our state to have a voice in this matter is negating the value of education to our families and children.

Do you support or oppose opening the state's primary elections to voters who aren't affiliated with either major political party? I support opening our primaries to voters not registered as

Democrats or Republicans. It's minimizing the value of Democracy by excluding a group of people who choose not to register with either party and negating their voice in the election process.

Do you support or oppose repealing a long-dormant 1969 state law that outlaws abortion, except in limited circumstances? I support removing this law as its existence is excluding women in having a voice in their health care. A majority of New Mexicans support removing this law as they recognize that abortion is safe, legal, and a decision that should be made between a woman and her doctor.

Would you support a merit-based evaluation system to determine how the state spends its capital outlay funding? Should each legislator be required to disclose which projects he or she funded? I do think each legislator should disclose who they fund and for how much. Using a merit-based system in determining capital outlay funding is unfair and ignores evaluating the need of communities and organizations based on ability to use those funds to help their residents and clients.

Do you support or oppose requiring lobbyists to disclose which bills they advocate for or against? I support requiring lobbyists to disclose who and what they are requesting support for. This is important for tax payers to know how much money is spent on lobbying efforts, what issues are being prioritized, and what legislator is supporting those efforts.

New Mexico is highly reliant on the oil and natural gas industries to generate revenue to fund state programs, as evidenced by recent oil boom and bust cycles. What are the things you would do to diversify the state's economy and revenue base? I believe we are missing out on a great deal of revenue by not legalizing cannabis and developing more renewable energy. We can regulate and tax the recreational cannabis industry, reduce our energy usage with renewable energy, and create jobs at the same time.

Do you support or oppose updating the current prohibition in the law on assisted suicide in order to allow aid-in-dying under certain medical circumstances? Allowing someone to die with dignity is one of the most humane things we can do. I support removing the prohibition law and allowing those with a terminal diagnosis or life expectancy of less than 6 months to have control over their remaining time on earth.

Would you support or oppose a moratorium on fracking? And should the state impose additional renewable energy mandates as a way to address climate change concerns? We do need a moratorium on fracking but also provide job training and resources to those impacted by the decrease in oil and gas use while we increase our implementation of renewable energy. Providing jobs and ways for people to make the same living will leave our state will be better off.

What steps should the Legislature take to address crime and improve public safety? The legislature needs to provide more funds for law enforcement for training, community education

programs and outreach, weed and seed programs and community policing. Engaging residents in a positive and healthy manner, with sensitivity to communities of color, can help strengthen the relationship between less crime and safer neighborhoods.

Do you support or oppose the practice of legislative budget-writing committees holding closed-door meetings during the crafting of state spending bills? I oppose closed-door meetings while crafting state spending bills. This leads to political deals being made, communities and organizations being used as pawns to gain political benefit, and is not even close to being transparent for the residents of New Mexico.

TRANSPORTATION

Transportation to work, school, and for medical needs should be available to everyone in the state. Where that infrastructure lacks in District 38, I will work with the South Central Regional Transit District to increase routes and ridership that will benefit the region.

RENEWABLE ENERGY

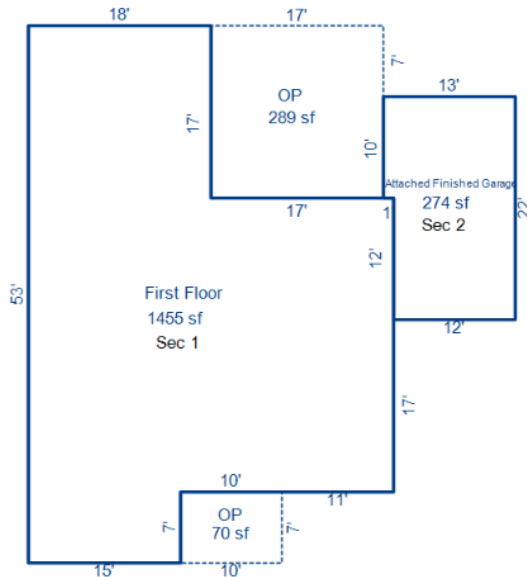
